MEMPHIS, April 20.—Les D'Arcy, the Australian pugilist whom American authorities have barred from engaging in fights in various parts of the country on the ground that he was a "slacker," today agreed to enlist under the American colors if permission is given him by the military authorities to engage in several fights he has booked for next June and July.

RESENTED BY THE "RED-BLOODED"

ATTENTION is called to the communication printed elsewhere from Lieutenant Commander J. H. Blackburn, U. S. N., in reply to editorial comment in the Mail Tribune of the 17th upon his telegram, which read: Medford has not responded to the president's call for young men as well as other cities of Oregon and I request your efforts to arouse red-blooded young men to their duty if there are any such in Medford.

The concluding slur was resented as unwarranted, and we think our position well taken. The navy is not the only branch of the national defense. Enlistments in the other branches require as much "red blood" as the navy. In addition to eight "red-blooded" youths enlisted in the navy proper, sixty-one "red-blooded" people enlisted from Medford and are now serving in the naval reserve—so the navy has no just complaint. In addition, enlistments in other branches of the service bring the total Medford enlistments up to nearly 300 "red-blooded" volunteers. For Portland to enlist as many in proportion to population 8000 would have to be enrolled.

The Mail Tribune has heartily co-operated in the enlistment propaganda, given freely of its space, particularly to the navy, and published many articles showing the advantages offered youth by the United States navy of today—probably donated more space than any small town paper in the state, and it will continue such efforts.

Lieutenant Commander Blackburn, like many commissioned officers imbued by the feudal caste spirit of the service, talks to the people as though they were enlisted men and had to suffer his sneers in silence—and evidently cannot understand why "red-blooded" common people resent it.

Every patriotic citizen—and that includes nearly every one among us—is anxious to serve his country in some capacity in the present crisis, and will heartily assist recruiting officers—if properly approached. But inuendo and jibe is not the way to secure this co-operation.

AUSTRIAN RULER HEARS PROMISES OF GERMAN SUBJECTS

AMSTERDAM, April 20.—A semi-official dispatch from Vienna says that Emperor Charles has granted an audience to leaders of the German party in Austria, in the presence of Premier Cma-Martinic. Herr Weisskercher, upper burgomaster of Vienna, declared: "The people of Austria hope that the very sacrifices of this unparalleled struggle, which was forced upon us for the honor and existence of our fatherland, will be recompensed by an honorable peace, which we most thankfully will accept from your majesty's hand with the promise that the German people will co-operate loyally and steadfastly in works of peace to the glory and greatness of Austria." Emperor Charles replied: "I assure you that I fully appreciate the seriousness and actuality of your political efforts. Germans in Austria may be assured that they possess my confidence. It is my intention to summon parliament shortly. Revival of parliamentary life at this moment, after years of suspension, is of extraordinary importance. I expect all parties will collaborate in harmony which demand respect and will work for the highest interests and necessities of the state. My government will adhere to its aims strictly. I confidently expect that the conviction of the necessity of harmonious co-operation among the representatives of all the peoples of Austria will prevail in the debates, thereby creating conditions propitious for the happy future of Austria."

SLAV SOCIALISTS FAVOR OFFENSIVE

PETROGRAD, April 20.—The Zornia Volia, the organ of the revolutionary socialists, declares that the prosecution of the war is necessary since Germany persists in her plans of conquest. The paper says: "A peace formula without annexations implies of necessity the restoration of the devastated countries of Belgium, Serbia, Montenegro and Rumania, and also the application of the principle of a plebiscite to decide the fate of the people in cases where there is a dispute. Germany still continues to seek conquests and to penetrate further into Russian territory. It is therefore necessary to accept the Calvary of war to the end. But the defense of the country and attention on our part to attempts at annexation in no way means that the soldiers are to remain in the trenches without attacking. An offensive is necessary to secure a successful end to the war."

GERMANS ADMIT RETREAT FROM BANKS OF AISNE

BERLIN, April 20.—The occupation of the Siegfried positions which long have been under construction, says the official statement issued today by the German army headquarters, began on March 16 and ended yesterday by the abandonment of the bank of the river Aisne between Conde and Souper. "The enemy," the statement adds, "follows hesitatingly." The German statement continues: "On the Arras battlefield the firing increases daily. Near St. Quentin it varies. The double battle on the Aisne and in the Champagne continues its normal course. A second French attempt to break through in the Champagne has been frustrated. Up to the present the French have used on both battlefields more than thirty divisions, which had been carefully reformed after the battle of the Somme."

ALLIED NATIONS REAP PROFIT OF MILLIONS IN WHEAT

CHICAGO, April 20.—The allied governments, dealing through Chicago brokers are credited today with having made a profit of more than \$3,500,000 in the last two months in "turns" on the grain market by changing from one option to the other. This profit, it is said, was made by selling a line of July wheat and buying the September option at a price approximately 39 cents below the July option. The allies, it is said, for a year have simply had speculative profit forced upon them. They had no desire to speculate but bought for future delivery with the desire to obtain actual wheat. Car shortages, embargoes and the inadequacy of ocean shipping prevented deliveries at specified times and the contracts were sold out at profits running well into the millions. At the opening of the market today July wheat shot up seven cents to \$2.11 and September 13 3-4 to \$1.89.

MEXICAN POLICY FOR NEUTRALITY

MEXICO CITY, April 20.—In answer to a report that Germany was endeavoring to influence members of the Mexican congress to oppose General Carranza's neutrality proclamation, General Eudemardo Reyes, president of the lower house, has issued the following statement: "I have no knowledge of German influence on members of congress or of pressure for opposition to plans of neutrality. I acknowledge that in the galleries of congress on Sunday there was a manifestation of sympathy for the German minister, but I immediately called the manifestants to order, telling them that any demonstration for or against any diplomat within the chamber was prohibited because we were obligated in accordance with General Carranza's policy to preserve strict neutrality in spirit as well as in letter."

SARAH BERNHARDT SHOWS SLIGHT IMPROVEMENT. NEW YORK, April 20.—The condition of Sarah Bernhardt, who was operated on here Tuesday night, again showed a slight improvement this morning.

UNION OF PEOPLES OFFERS HOPE OF WORLD FEDERATION

PHILADELPHIA, April 20.—The "grand alliance" between the United States and the democracies of Europe against autocratic aggression as practiced by Germany gives rise to the hope that the war will lead to a federation of the world, in the opinion of Walter Lippmann, of New York, associate editor of the "New Republic," expressed today in an address on "America's Relations to the World Conflict," before the American Academy of Political and Social Science. "I know it sounds a little old fashioned to use that phrase, the Federation of the World," said Mr. Lippmann, "because we have used it so long to describe the alliance. It is no longer an offensive-defensive military agreement among diplomats. It is growing into a union of peoples determined to end forever that irritating, adventurous nationalism which has torn the world for three centuries. The war is dissolving into a stupendous revolution. A few months ago we still argued about the Baghdad corridor, strategic frontiers, oil-pipes. These were the stakes of the diplomats' war. The whole perspective is changed today by the revolution in Russia and the intervention of America. The scale of values is transformed, for the democracies are unopposed. We are at war to defeat the German government, to destroy its prestige, to deny its conquests and to throw it back into the arms of the German people, marked and discredited as the author of their miseries. It is for them to make the final settlement with it. We can win nothing from this war unless it culminates in a union of liberal peoples pledged to cooperate in the settlement of all outstanding questions, sworn to turn against the aggressor, determined to erect a larger and more modern system of international law upon a federation of the world. That is what we are fighting for at this moment, on the ocean, in the shipyard and in the factory; later, perhaps in France and Belgium, ultimately at the council of peace."

CHICAGO FAILS TO ENLIST NEEDED MEN

CHICAGO, April 20.—There is said to be small comfort for advocates of the volunteer system in the navy recruiting figures in Chicago to date. Under terms of the original order "since extended to May fifth," the recruiting bureau was called upon to enlist 1800 men by tonight. The figures last night were slightly more than 500 and it was officially stated that at best they would but slightly exceed 600 tonight, despite every effort of the recruiting officers.
