UNIVERSITY CLUB FAVORS UNIVERSAL CONSCRIPTION

The Rogue River University club composed of over one hundred members representing forty-nine colleges and universities, through a referendum of all its members has unanimously endorsed the principles of conscription as against the volunteer system and respectfully urge that you use every effort to secure passage of such a bill. The club feels that only through such means can the war be efficiently prosecuted. This sentiment is not confined to any class or condition but is generally urged by the people throughout Jackson county. This country's experience in the civil war and England's more recent mistakes should be a warning.

ROOT AND RUSSIA.

IN SELECTING Elihu Root as head of the American mission to Russia to offer assistance and aid to the new democracy President Wilson chose probably the ablest of old school statesmen, but one who can have little in common with the Russian revolution. Mr. Root, while a fine type of man and a representative American, is not a representative democrat or a believer in democracy as democracy is defined in Russia.

To Mr. Root with his snug stand-pat ideas and his ultra-conservativeness, his love of constitutional restrictions, his distrust of so-called popular government, the tory sacredness with which he regards property and its vested rights, the ideals of the Russian democracy must seem little less than anarchy.

The flag of the new democracy is the red flag of socialism and the Slavs' conception of democracy is a brotherhood of humanity, loosely knit together by restrictions for the common good. To the mystical Russian, the materialistic United States, hemmed in by hard and fast constitutional restrictions that retard and prevent progress, is scarcely regarded as a democracy—but a survival of Anglo-Saxon feudalism in which plutocracy has replaced aristocracy.

It cannot be said that the United States by example or precept has directly inspired the Russian revolution, although of course the example of a republic growing in wealth, population and power, has been an inspiration to world democracy. Russian democracy is rather the product of the socialistic, anarchistic propaganda engendered by the abuses, tyranny and inefficiency of Russian autocracy and brought to a head by autocracy's breakdown and Russia's defeat in the world war.

American democrats, like Mr. Root, laugh at the theory of the divine rights of monarchs. They regard it as absurd to hold that anyone has hereditary right to rule or govern his fellow man. Yet these same American democrats believe in the divine right of property, the hereditary right of individuals to monopolize opportunity, which in the long run is ruling and governing humanity. The two theories differ only in degree—and between the two, the theory of an hereditary aristocracy is preferable, for the ruler acknowledges responsibilities by service while the possessor of inherited wealth frequently renders no service to society, but leads the useless existence of a parasite that sucks its life blood.

There is mighty little of Christian brotherhood about American democracy. Though its ideals are liberty and equality, in practice it is largely grab and greed. The opportunity sought is the way to wealth. But to the Russian, with his religious nature, his semi-oriental fatalism, democracy really means brotherhood—and the Russian has a big advantage—he has not been feudalized.

The American mission can and will be of great assistance to Russia in a material way, and will help cement the bonds of friendship that binds the big eastern with the great western democracy, though it is exceedingly doubtful whether the duma asks Mr. Root to draft a constitution, or whether if he prepared such a document for the perpetuation of privilege, as he prepared for New York state, Russians would accept it.

GERMAN PATROLS HAMPERING NEUTRALS

COPENHAGEN, April 27.—German patrol boats are continuing their activities against neutral shipping in the Skagerrak. Recently the Scandinavian-American liner United States was halted and examined. Yesterday the Norwegian passenger liner Haarfagre, plying between Frederikshaven, Denmark and Christian-sund, Norway, was seized and taken to a German port.

PLANT SEVENTY-FIVE ACRES IN STAPLE VEGETABLES

T. W. Osgood, W. S. Campbell and S. A. Nye will produce staple vegetables this year in large acreage to help to meet the extraordinary demand for that class of foodstuff. On their Central Point ranch they will raise 10 acres of beans, 10 acres of beets and 10 acres of corn and other grain. These vegetables will be cultivated in their orchard. Although the latter is productive, the cultivation of the vegetables in it will be beneficial, since the garden stuff will be planted a reasonable distance from the bearing trees.

In the Berkeley orchard, near Jacksonville, Mr. Osgood and L. L. Stover will raise 10 acres of beans, 10 acres of corn and 20 acres of grain. The soil is excellent for these crops and in fine condition this year to insure a bumper yield.

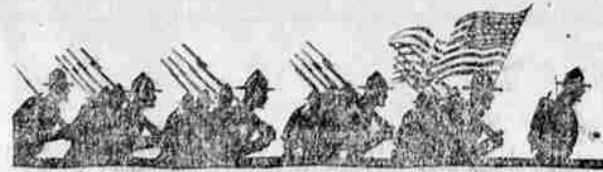

GERMAN SOLDIERS GET DISCOURAGED

COPENHAGEN, April 27.—General Von Stein, German minister of war, admitted before the reichstag military affairs committee that field post letters from soldiers at the front showed a certain amount of discouragement but that, in general, the spirit of the troops was good. The committee then sent assurances of solid support to the army which the radical socialist members of the committee alone refused to sign. The committee rejected a radical socialist proposal to establish a committee of parliamentary control to supervise the conduct of the war. Herr Stuegeln, a socialist, complained that men were sent to the front as punishment.

ALLIES TO NEED HALF BILLION MONTH

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Between \$400,000,000 and \$500,000,000 a month will be required by the allied nations in war loans from the United States a preliminary report in Secretary McAdoo's hands indicated today. Great Britain needs \$200,000,000 to \$250,000,000 a month, France \$100,000,000 to \$125,000,000, Russia not more than \$100,000,000 and Italy about \$50,000,000. These figures are tentative but Secretary McAdoo is anxious to reduce them speedily to a definite basis so that he may recommend soon to President Wilson a program for issuing the necessary securities.

RUSSIAN MOB ATTACKS SENNE FOR PEACE TALK

PETROGRAD, April 27.—A small riot was precipitated last night when a crowd drove the audience of the Socialist Senne into the street as protest against his exhortations for a separate peace and his attacks on the provisional government. A score of Senne's followers were arrested but the agitator himself remains at liberty as the government fears that his arrest would make him a martyr. Senne, who recently returned from exile through Germany, has become the leader of the faction of the Socialists who desire the end of the war. He is living in the palace of the dancer, Khashinska, a former favorite of the emperor, from the balconies of which he daily and nightly harangues his followers. It is generally assumed that he is in the pay of Germany. With the new freedom of speech in the press and assembly there is a deluge of new dailies and periodicals and numberless conferences and conventions of peoples of all trades, professions and callings. The separate peace element appears to be concentrated in the groups under Senne's domination.
