

CHICAGO WHEAT TAKES FLURRY, WITH BIG DROP

WINNIPEG, Man., April 28.—Announcement was made at the Winnipeg Grain exchange today that no trading in futures would be permitted in the pit hereafter without securing the sanction of a censoring committee.

Chicago Market Spasm.
CHICAGO, April 28.—Liquidating sales became general as the result of the Winnipeg news and were increased by word that in Omaha no more trades in May wheat would be cleared except the closing out of old contracts. Fifteen minutes before the close here, nearly all gains for the day had been wiped out and July wheat was back to \$2.25 1/2, with May at \$2.69. Before the day ended the collapse of prices here was extended to 15 1/2 to 220 for July. The close was wild at a range varying from 2 1/2 net loss to 7c advance as compared with 24 hours before, last quotations being 2.74 to 2.74 1/2 for May and 2.25 to 2.26 for July.

RECORD PRICE FOR NEWTOWN APPLES

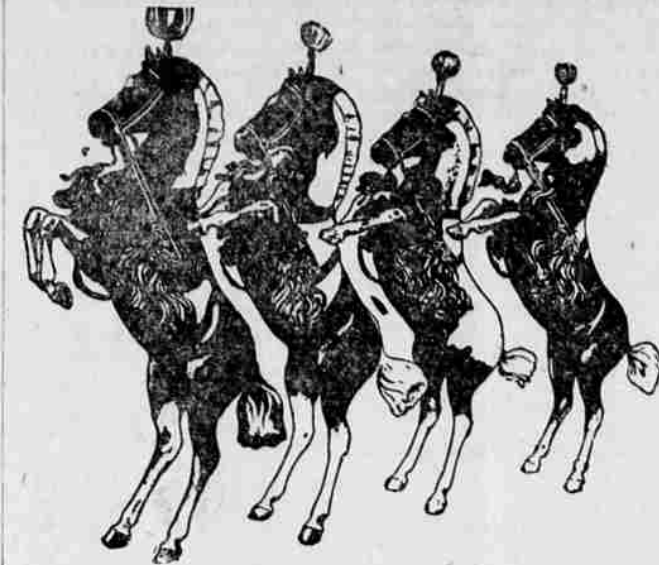
The record price of the season, so far as is known, for Newtown apples is \$2.53 a box.

FRUIT JUICES FOR CIRCUS MENAGERIE

Al G. Barnes, the owner of the big wild west animal circus which will exhibit here on Wednesday, is considered by the fruit exchanges in California (where the show has winter quarters) as being the largest single consumer of fruit juices in the west. Fruit juices have been adopted as animal "Mellen's Food" for their huge animal circus and Mr. Barnes is most enthusiastic over the introduction and substitution of fruit juices on the menagerie menu.

During the training period, from December to March, when the circus was in winter quarters at Venice, California, 117,326 gallons of fruit juices were consumed by the animals of the Barnes' aggregation, both herbaceous and carnivorous.

Louis Roth, the chief trainer, had been experimenting for the past eight years to find a substitute for the distasteful laxatives which it was necessary formerly to give the animals during the training period. After

trying everything in the regular animal medicine chest, Roth hit upon the plan of fruit juices, which he found to contain admirable nutriment, as well as laxative qualities.

Since then he has made a table which is posted in each cage, stating the kind and amount of fruit juice necessary for the good health of a given type of animal.

Upon his arrival in Medford, Mr. Roth will sample the fruit products here to ascertain if they have any added nutriment value.

S. P. Freight Handlers Strike.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—Approximately 450 freight handlers for the Southern Pacific company walked out here today following the rejection of their demands for a 20 per cent increase in wages and time and a half for overtime. Company officials said the men are unorganized.

German-Swiss Frontier Closed.

ZURICH, Switzerland, April 28.—The German-Swiss frontier has been strictly closed to all travelers and postal service. No German newspapers have arrived since Wednesday. This is usually the prelude to an important military move.
