RESUMPTION OF GOLD IMPORTS

NEW YORK, May 11.—Resumption of British gold imports assumed large proportions today, another consignment of \$18,046,000 from Canada to J. P. Morgan & Company being deposited in the local federal reserve bank.

This makes an aggregate of \$48,600,000 received here in the last three days, \$282,000,000 since the beginning of the year and a grand total of \$1,529,000,000 since January, 1915.

The movement is in keeping with the policy of the British government, whose fiscal authorities now in this country acknowledge the necessity for maintaining gold imports in order to stabilize the sterling market at this center.

DRIVE UPON BULGARIANS

(Continued from Page One.)

LONDON, May 11.—Furious assaults along practically the entire Bulgarian-German lines in Macedonia by the allied forces are reported in a Bulgarian official report, issued on Thursday. The report claims the repulse of all attacks but says that the most violent artillery action is progressing day and night.

In the neighborhood of Makova, about 15 miles northeast of Monastir, the Bulgarians say that a vigorous attack was opened after a heavy bombardment but collapsed with heavy losses. It was followed by another attack which the report says was completely shattered.

Farther to the east the allies assaulted the Bulgarian lines in the direction of Stravina and Gradashnitsa but all attacks, according to Sofia, were repulsed.

Berlin Official Report

BERLIN, May 11.—Mutual artillery firing of the greatest violence prevailed over the entire Arras front in France yesterday, says the official statement issued today by the German army headquarters staff.

Eighteen British and French airplanes were brought down on the western front.

New Reserves Present

PARIS, May 11.—Four fresh German divisions have been observed on the Aisne front since May 7, says an official summary of the operations on May 4 to 6. The statement adds:

"This is irrefutable proof of how these effectives are being used up. German losses in these three days exceed all estimates."

Serbs Take Trenches

SALONKI, May 11.—Advanced trenches in the neighborhood of Dobropolye, on the Macedonian front, have been captured by the Serbians. A Serbian official statement issued today, reporting this success, reads:

"In several localities our infantry carried out successful surprise attacks on enemy trenches, especially in the region of Dobropolye, where we again captured some advanced enemy trenches, took one officer and 54 men and captured one machine gun."

British Repel Assaults

LONDON, May 11.—German attacks delivered last night on the British positions east of Arlenx and south of the Sanchez river. All the assaults, in one of which liquid fire was employed, were repulsed.

PLAN PAVING OF SISKIYOU HIGHWAY

In a letter just received by Secretary Geo. E. Boos from Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer, he says:

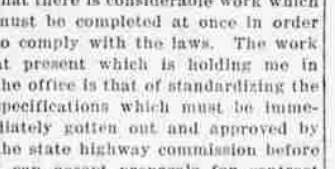
"In taking over this office I find that there is considerable work which must be completed at once in order to comply with the laws. The work at present which is holding me in the office is that of standardizing the specifications which must be immediately gotten out and approved by the state highway commission before I can accept proposals for contract work.

We are rushing this work for the particular reason that we expect to do some contract work between Siskiyou and the California line. At the present time, we hope to let a contract there for approximately six and one-half miles of pavement to complete the gap between the top of the hill and the California line. In order to let this contract in time to complete the work this year, it is necessary for us to make all the haste possible."
