APPEALS FOR AID TO FEED STARVING BELGIAN KIDDIES

To the Editor: In these troublous times we are all continually solicited to help this and that cause that needs assistance and in most instances the help solicited is in behalf of charities or causes so worthy that they appeal to us and we would be glad to contribute to every one of them if we were financially able to do so.

There is one appeal, however, that comes to us that we must not and cannot ignore, the cry of the starving children of Belgium. 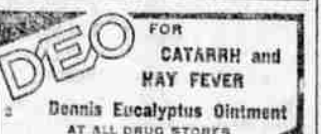
