ORDINANCE NO. 884. An ordinance amending Ordinance No. 874 of the city of Medford, entitled "An Ordinance regulating the use and sale of water in the city of Medford, Oregon, and prescribing rates for use thereof, and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, approved February 16th, 1917."

Section 1. That Ordinance No. 874 entitled "An Ordinance regulating the use and sale of water in the city of Medford, Oregon, and prescribing rates for use thereof, and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, approved February 16th, 1917," be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 26, and to read as follows: "Section 26. That from and after June 1st, 1917, minimum monthly water rates for the items hereinafter mentioned shall be as follows: Livery and feed stables, base rate \$4.00 to \$15.00. Ice manufacturing plants, minimum rate, \$15.00. Manufactures: Sawmills, box factories, shingle mills, cement pipe factories, spray plants, etc., minimum rate, \$15.00.

Section 2. That said Ordinance No. 874 be and the same is hereby further amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 27, and to read as follows: "Section 27. In cases which do not come under any of the classifications in said Ordinance No. 874, there shall be a minimum rate of \$1.50 dollars per month for the first 5000 gallons or minor fraction thereof." Section 3. That said Ordinance No. 874 be and the same is hereby further amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 28, and to read as follows: "Section 28. That from and after June 1st, 1917, all vacant lots used for garden purposes shall have a flat rate of five cents (5c) per 100 square feet or fraction thereof. This rate shall cover the irrigating season in each and every year and shall be paid to the city treasurer between June 1st and June 15th of each and every year." Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after June 1st, 1917. The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the City of Medford on the 15th day of May, 1917, by the following vote: Emmens, aye; Gaddie, aye; Keene, aye; Carkin, aye; Davis, aye; and Hargrave, aye.
