### SOUTHERN OREGON POULTRY FANCIERS MEET SATURDAY

The Southern Oregon Poultry association will hold its regular meeting on Saturday afternoon, May 26, at the public library hall. This organization is making a strong effort to overcome the burden imposed unprofitably last winter in an unusual preparation to entertain the annual meeting of the State Poultry association in Medford on representations that failed. The collective debt incurred has proved burdensome and the local association is closing arrangements to clear up the balance due to various individuals who participated in the work of holding the show.

A new constitution and by-laws will be adopted and much business of importance will be transacted. A full attendance should take part in the work of that session. The meetings have not been attended as they should have been, the secretary announces, the work being left to a few who now insist on the manifestation of a more general interest. The association has done much good in the matter of increasing poultry production in this county and greatly improving the quality of the hatch and the volume of the egg output. It is a splendid industry for profit, where the farmer produces much of his own food, and it ought to be productive of tens of thousands of dollars annually, even to the few who have lately concluded to specialize in pure blood chickens.

If the members of the association are really in earnest about their interest in their own business, they should attend the meeting Saturday afternoon. War exactions make the poultry industry peculiarly attractive, this season.

"Between Fajti and the sea the enemy sent succeeding waves against our line. Whenever one wave collapsed, another followed. Thus the struggle continues undiminished in violence. The enemy has only gained ground protecting Jamiano where we had withdrawn our troops one kilometer. Otherwise we maintained our positions victoriously to the full extent everywhere."

**On French Front.**

PARIS, May 25.—Part of Chevreaux woods on the front was captured last night by the French, the war office announces. The German shelters were found to have been demolished by the French artillery and to be filled with dead.

LONDON, May 25.—"During the night a local hostile attack against one of our posts in the Hindenburg line southwest of Fontaine Lez Croisilles was driven off," says today's war office report. "A German raiding party northeast of Arleux also was repulsed with heavy losses. We had no casualties."
