

INDUSTRIAL ART EXHIBITION HELD NEXT MONDAY

Next Monday and Tuesday from 2 to 5 o'clock the industrial art exhibition will be held at the high school building under direction of Miss Griffith, supervisor of art in the public schools. She will be assisted in receiving the visitors by the presidents of the various parent-teacher circles, including Mrs. F. W. Mears, Washington school; Mrs. John Perl, Lincoln school; Mrs. Maddox, Roosevelt school; Mrs. Irvine, Jackson school, and Mrs. Leonard, high school.

The general public is cordially invited to view the exhibit and it will be worth seeing, for hundreds of clever designs in commercial art, costuming, interior decorating, in drawings, posters, charts, etc., nearly all in original color work, done by the pupils of all grades, make one marvel at the creative genius and general ability of the pupils of all ages, and all done on the scientific principles as taught in the art department of the schools.

The exhibit is full of original and useful ideas originating in the heads of the pupils, and illustrates the commercial art work as taught from the first stages up until the close of high school. Then too, most of the color work and painting of the various designs is very clever and tasteful. The scenery about Medford and the valley, and the various big amusement features and seasonal events and holidays of the past year are reflected in the color and other designs as well as impressions of the fruit season. Outside of the art commercial features there are many novelty designs of useful articles.

APPLEGATE PICNIC SUCCESSFUL EVENT

The annual Applegate valley school meet and picnic of the Valley Trade creamery Thursday was, as it always is, a jolly affair attended not only by the people of the Applegate valley but by many from Medford and all parts of the county, and from Josephine county. Due to the chilly weather the attendance was not up to that of former years, but the crowd was estimated at 600. The high school band of Medford furnished music for the occasion.

The forenoon was given over to general visiting and the field meet in which all the schools of the Applegate valley competed in athletic contests for a silver cup donated by the creamery company. At noon an old-fashioned basket picnic dinner was served which was much enjoyed.

The afternoon was given over to the usual picnic contests for men, women, boys and girls, many of these events causing hearty laughter and much vociferous applause on the part of the many onlookers. Then came the speaking program with Miles Cantrell presiding. Following a patriotic address by Attorney H. A. Canady of Medford, and an address on the war food preparedness campaign by County Pathologist C. C. Cate, the meeting partook of the nature of a rally in favor of the bond issue for good roads that will be voted on at the coming election.

Mayor C. E. Gates and John A. Westerlund of Medford made strong appeals for votes in favor of the bond measure, and pointed out the general benefits that will accrue to all parts of the county through improved roads.

The day's festivities closed with a dance at night.

WOMEN WORKERS IN PARIS STRIKE

PARIS, May 25.—The strike of women workers spread rapidly today and is meeting with considerable success. The milliners, furriers, lace makers, embroiderers, water-proofers and feather workers are now on strike and during the day male and female employees of several department stores approached the managements and asked for a Saturday half-holiday and extra pay on account of the high cost of living. The stores were closed at 1 o'clock but were reopened at 4 o'clock, an agreement having been reached.

Similar demands by bankers and brokers' clerks were accepted by a number of business houses but are being resisted in other cases. The butchers, waiters and grocers unions representatives of the employers and workers of the fur trade reached an agreement tonight and work will be resumed tomorrow.

JAPAN DRAWING CONSIDERABLE GOLD FROM AMERICA

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Japan is withdrawing gold from the United States at a rate which has caused considerable interest and some speculation as to the meaning of the movement. Approximately \$35,000,000 has been withdrawn since January 1 and other withdrawals are expected in the future.

Officials here feel that the movement is not fully accounted for by the balance of trade. The possibility that some of the other allied governments are paying their munitions bills to Japan with gold in this country made available by the extension of credits by this government, has been discussed but it is believed that this contingency likewise would not account for the strong current of gold shipments westward.

The gold supply at San Francisco, from which shipments to Japan are made, has at present reached a point where the government has decided the cost of transferring gold across the country properly should be borne by the interests intending to ship it out of the country. In addition the retention here of the increased gold supply largely accumulated during the war is regarded as highly desirable and its exportation is discouraged.

Treasury officials under existing laws have no power to prohibit the exportation of gold, but must redeem gold certificates with gold.

BELGIAN BURGOMASTERS SENT TO PRISON

AMSTERDAM, May 25.—The Telegraph states that the burgomaster of Boisfort, Belgium, and Deputy Le Mourret of Brussels have been condemned to imprisonment in a fortress for nine and twelve months respectively for refusal to deliver to the German authorities all supplies of iron wire available to them.

BARNEBURG SELLS 450 HEAD CATTLE GETTING \$20,000

A large cattle deal was consummated recently when Henry Barneburg sold his entire herd of cattle, 450 head, to D. W. Parker of Klamath county for a price said to be around \$20,000. Mr. Barneburg is going out of the cattle business. Until July 1 the cattle will be run on their present range, the Hagardine tract on Grizzly Butte. After that the steers will be cut out and sent to the Lindsey ranch in the Dead Indian country to be fattened and the stockers will be driven to the Klamath county range.

The fact that the Hagardine range, which he and L. A. Nell had leased from the Ben Selling and Joe Simon

interests of Portland was recently taken over by the Rosenberg brothers of Medford who will run sheep on it, was an important factor in inducing Mr. Barneburg to go out of the cattle business in this vicinity.

L. A. Nell and son, Elmo, with whom Mr. Barneburg was associated in the lease of the land, have about 400 head of cattle on it, but have not yet announced their future plans concerning these cattle.
