ARSON CASE IN HANDS OF JURY; VERDICT THURSDAY

The fate of Mrs. M. M. Garwood, on trial on the charge of conspiracy to defraud the insurance company by plotting to burn the Strickfadden house in Ashland last March, is now in the hands of the jury into whose hands it was given by Judge Calkins at 6:30 o'clock Tuesday evening.

The Judge, however, excused the jury until 9 o'clock Thursday morning, when it will begin its deliberations on the case.

Testimony in the case was completed late Tuesday afternoon and District Attorney Roberts for the state and Attorney Gus Newbury for the defendant made their arguments before the jury.

POLISH COUNCIL OF STATE RESIGNS

COPENHAGEN, May 30.—According to a private report from Germany, for which there is as yet no positive confirmation, the provisional council of state in Poland yesterday transmitted the resignations of its members to the Austro-German authorities.

The council has been pressing for the appointment of a regent for the kingdom and the regularization of the Polish administration, since its own position has been rendered extremely difficult, if not impossible, by a resolution adopted by the Polish National council expressing lack of confidence in the body selected.

OREGON AMBUANCE CORPS FOR FRANCE

EUGENE, Ore., May 30.—Dr. J. Eberle Kaykendall, who was recently commissioned by the war department to organize the fourteenth Red Cross ambulance corps, has been notified to recruit the corps to full strength at once, so that it may be sent to Allentown, Pa. for training and thence to France at the earliest possible date.

DECISION NEAR AT HAND PREDICTS GERMAN KAISER

COPENHAGEN, May 30.—The correspondent of the Berlin Tageblatt reports that Emperor William, during his recent visit to the Arras line, addressed delegations from the troops fighting on the Aisne. He thanked them with evident emotion for their heroism in meeting French attacks and said in part:

"The decision lies near at hand. You will turn in our favor as you have on every previous occasion because you realize what you are fighting for—the future of your children and grand children, the future of your beloved fatherland."

18 BRITISH SHIPS SUNK BY U-BOATS

LONDON, May 30.—Eighteen British merchant vessels of more than 1600 tons were sunk during the past week, it was officially announced tonight. One vessel of less than 1600 tons and two fishing vessels were sunk.

WESTERN FARMERS OPPOSE FEDERAL CONTROL OF FOOD

LINCOLN, Neb., May 30.—J. W. Shorthill, secretary of the Nebraska Co-operative Grain and Livestock association, will go to Washington Friday as a representative of co-operative grain and livestock associations in 11 middle western states to protest to congressional committees considering food legislation against fixing maximum prices for farm products.

Mr. Shorthill said he would appear "especially for the grain producers of the middle west." He said he would represent associations in the following states: Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Nebraska, Kansas, North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, Minnesota, Oklahoma and Colorado.

"We are opposed to government legislation fixing maximum prices for any commodity unless it is known to be under monopolistic control or unless it is to break a speculative corner," said Mr. Shorthill.
