**MANCHU REVOLT REPORTED IN CHINA**

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—Discontent against the republic in China has caused the revolt of two provinces and trouble in five more, according to cable advices received by Chinese newspapers here today.

Ni Shi Chung, the dispatch said, is heading the revolt and has stirred Anhui province of which he is military governor, and Cheking province, adjoining to active rebellion. Shantung, Honan, Fungtein, Fukien and Hupei provinces were reported to be in arms but not formally to have joined the movement. All these are northern and eastern provinces where Manchu sentiment has flourished. The southern provinces are said to be firmly behind the republic.

**LEMERY IS FREED ON CHARGE OF BLACKMAIL**

It took a jury in the circuit court at Jacksonville yesterday but a few minutes to return a verdict of "not guilty" in the case of George O. Van Notta of Ashland against Attorney J. A. Lemery of that city on a charge of blackmail. Van Notta presented a letter from the Ashland attorney in which the latter used the payment of a bill amounting to \$17.75, and also mentioned the fact that the plaintiff had been accused of stealing a horse collar from a Mr. Thomason to whom the original amount was owed. Prosecuting Attorney Roberts maintained this constituted a threat to extort money while Attorney H. A. Canaday who defended the Ashland attorney maintained his client had merely stated a fact and hoped to warn Van Notta so he could avoid trouble. The case showed that there is considerable feeling among the elderly residents in the environs of Ashland and it is probable the case will lead to further court action.

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## MEDFORD RATE CASE IS ARGUED

The interstate commerce commission hearing of the railroad rate case whose outcome is of so much importance to the future of Medford as a shipping and jobbing center, was concluded today at the public library building before James J. Bell, of Washington, attorney examiner for the interstate commerce commission.

A number of Medford business and railroad men were witnesses and close listeners at the hearing. Representatives of local wholesale houses and several local shippers and railroad men gave testimony.

The case is that of the commercial club against the Southern Pacific, and the complaint charges undue discrimination in rates against Medford in favor of San Francisco, Sacramento and Portland on shipments to California points. Medford was represented by Attorney Frank H. McCane of San Francisco, who presented a strong case in behalf of local interests.

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## ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING IN INTEREST OF ROAD BONDS

An enthusiastic good roads meeting was held at the high school building at Talent, Thursday evening, May 31, and a very large representation of the voters of that district were present. The principal speakers were Prof. F. C. Reimer, F. W. Mearns, and W. H. Gore, who brought up some interesting topics on the bonding issue, and answered many questions asked by the voters. From the interest shown by those present, there is no doubt but what the Talent district will give a big majority in favor of the bonding issue. The Talent people have benefited from their experience of the Pacific highway and know the value of the hard surfaced roads. H. W. Frame presided. Short, interesting speeches were made by S. S. Stevens, J. A. Westerland, J. H. Fuller, and George Boos.

Tonight a big meeting is to be held at Central Point and Saturday night the Farmers mass meeting will be held at Medford, which everybody is invited to attend.
