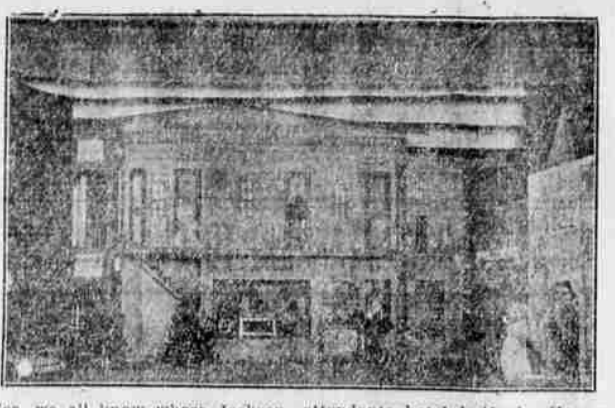

GUILTY VERDICT IN RAGSDALE CASE

The jury in the case against John Ragdale of Lake Creek charged with criminal assault on his stepdaughter, Bessie Downing, brought in a verdict of guilty Saturday afternoon. The jury was out but a short time.

Ragdale was defended by Attorneys H. A. Canaday and E. E. Kelly. District Attorney Roberts conducted the prosecution. The case has attracted much attention in the Lake Creek district. In the indictment it was alleged that Ragdale's attentions to the young woman had covered a period of years since she was 11 years old.

Two civil actions against Ragdale are pending in court as a result of this case. His wife is suing for a divorce and for division of the Ragdale estate, and Fredericka Downing is suing to recover money.

JACKSONVILLE BOY OFF FOR FRANCE

A special military train bearing 250 men of the Eighth engineers' reserve corps, scheduled to leave for the war front in France in the near future, passed thru the city this noon enroute from San Francisco, where the Eighth corps is being retrained, to the big military camp at American Lake, Washington. The detachment was in command of Colonel Cavannah, the commander of the corps.

Most of the men in the corps are experienced in railroad work either in the traffic or construction departments. Among their number today was John Donegan, a former well known Jacksonville man. The remainder of the corps will pass thru here enroute to American lake within the next few days.

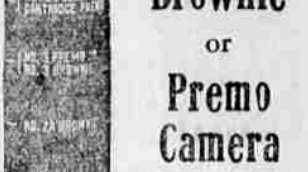

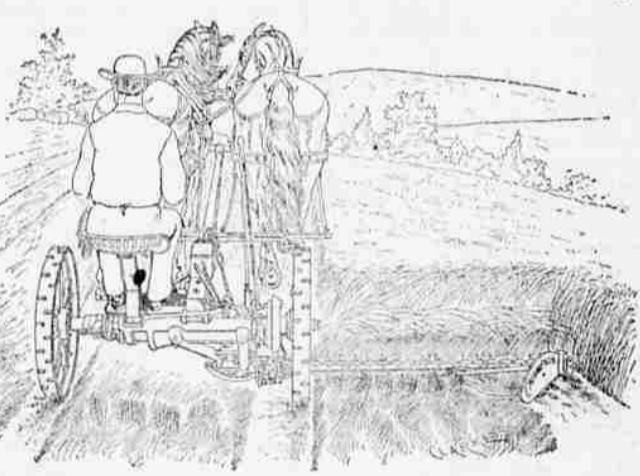
