ONE-DRY LAW IN WASHINGTON SUSPENDED

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 5.—E. M. Williams of Seattle, today filed with the secretary of state petitions for a referendum vote on the home dry prohibition law, passed by the 1917 legislature. The petition bore 24,200 names, 23,657 being required.

The home dry law, which was to have become effective at midnight between June 6 and 7, is now automatically suspended, permitting a continuation of the permit system, which has existed since Jan. 1, 1916.

On July 1 the Reed amendment, passed by congress, is expected to make the state home dry.

REGISTRATION IS UP TO THE MARK

Registration for military duty is proceeding satisfactorily in Medford and Jackson county as far as heard from. The registration is fully up to the mark expected.

Threats of refusal to register have been common in the Butte Creek sections and an effort to organize against registration has been reported north of Central Point, but no disturbances are reported.

GERMAN SPY SYSTEM BEING SNARED IN WEW OF U. S.

NEW YORK, June 5.—Evidence that two complete high-powered wireless installations, assembled here from various sources, were shipped (piece-meal) to Mexico, supposedly for use of a German spy system in that country, was unearthed today, in connection with the arrest of three men on charges of conspiracy to send mail, containing information, surreptitiously from the United States to Germany through members of the Norwegian ship crews. It was intimated by the federal commissioner by whom the alleged plotters were arraigned, that it was through their instrumentality that advance news of the impending arrival in England of the American destroyer fleet was sent to Germany before it even became generally known in this country that it had sailed.

Secret Mail System

Indications have been found that the secret mail system was operated both ways between the United States, Germany and Mexico. Several hundred letters have been seized and are being translated in the expectation that they will open the way to full revelations of the alleged spy plot.

The prisoners are Harry A. Perissi and Irving Bonaparte, both said to be American born, employed by a German electrical company here, and Axel E. Melcher, said to be a naturalized citizen from Sweden. They are charged with conspiring to induce members of the crews of the steamships Bergensfjord and Kristianfjord, both chartered to carry regular United States mails, to take letters and packages from this country destined for Germany, in violation of the law prohibiting competition with the United States mail.

Heavy Ball Fixed

When the three men were arraigned before Federal Commissioner Hitchcock ball was fixed at \$25,000 for Perissi and Bonaparte and \$20,000 for Melcher.

That others are implicated and that the arrested men are willing to tell all they know, was indicated by counsel for Bonaparte, who said his client was willing to help the government in every way in his power.
