HALF IN REGISTRATION

OLYMPIA, June 6.—Lieutenant-Governor Hart, in charge of registration, estimated this afternoon that Washington had registered 120,000 men of military age, as against a federal government estimate of 212,000. Mr. Hart believes there was general complacency with the registration law, the small total being due to the government estimate of population being too high.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—A statue of Sequoyah, inventor of the Cherokee alphabet, was unveiled today at Oklahoma's first contribution to Statuary hall at the capitol.

Sequoyah, whose English name was George Guess, was the son of a white trader and a full blooded Cherokee woman. His life among the Indians made him familiar with the Cherokee tongue and in 1821 he devised an alphabet of 85 characters. His accomplishment was unique, since he never learned to read or write English.

ALBANIA WOULD BE FREE.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Albania, following the lead of many of its chieftains, has decided its independence and has requested the protection of the Italian government until such time as the independence of the country can be maintained. It was learned here tonight through official dispatches from Rome, Italy, after considering the Albanian case, decided itself in agreement with the plan, but withheld its formal acceptance because the minority of the Albanian chieftains in the mountain regions of the northeast did not join in the request.

1014 REGISTERED IN 48 OUT OF 60 COUNTY PRECINCTS
