### AID FOR RUSSIA IS THE AIM OF AMERICA

PETROGRAD, June 15.—David R. Francis, the American ambassador, issued to the press today a long statement, explaining the aims of the American mission, headed by Ellhu Root, which arrived in Petrograd yesterday. The statement is thus summarized by the official News Agency: "The communique states that the functions of the mission are to devise, in accord with the Russian government, effective means to aid Russia in her efforts to defeat the universal enemy of democracy. Germany and the German standpoint are the greatest foes to the democratic ideas, now cherished by America and Russia in common.

**America's Motives**  
"The mission will elucidate the aims of America in the war, making it clear that America is inspired by idealistic motives; also that she is devoting to the struggle all her material resources, the indications of which are the facts that the American fleet now is operating jointly with the entente allies' fleet, that ten million Americans are registered and the economic support which America can lend. Realizing that Russia must not only fight but live, America will try to reduce the burdens and privations borne by the Russian people."

### ALL EXPECTED TO AID RED CROSS IN RAISING FUND

Membership in the local Red Cross will have positively no bearing on the National Red Cross war campaign commencing next Monday noon, Campaign Manager Daniels declared today. The campaign committee wishes every one shall understand that the \$15,000 fund to be raised in Jackson county the coming week must be very largely subscribed to by people who already have indicated their patriotism by giving their dollar yearly membership in the Red Cross.

Daniels said today: "Before January first hundreds of young men will have left Jackson county. Most of them will have become accustomed to actual war service in France and it is most probable that hundreds of them will be in base hospitals across the water, suffering with wounds received while fighting for the people who remain safe at home. The comfort and care of these young men, all of them dear to people right here at home, is going to depend on what Jackson county people are willing to do in the big campaign next week. Everyone will be given an opportunity to demonstrate his patriotism with a subscription and it will be up to everyone to decide how many dollars he is willing to give to buy supplies for suffering American patriots. The committee of more than a hundred people, giving its money and its time to the cause, does not think there is a person who will not give generously and willingly. Such a person must be branded as a 'slacker' and unworthy of American citizenship."

When the committee members call on you they ask that you remember that every member has given generously to the cause, and that the committee's work be made easy by being ready with what your patriotism and your conscience inspires you to give.

### AIM TO MAKE OREGON FIRST IN RED CROSS FUND

Oregon first in army and navy enlistments.

Oregon first in Liberty bond over-subscription.

Now add the third great entry on the National Honor Roll.

Oregon first to over-subscribe its \$600,000 quota of the \$100,000,000 Red Cross emergency war fund.
