

SCHOOL ELECTION FOR DIRECTORS TO BE HELD MONDAY

The annual school meeting will be held next Monday, June 18, from 2 o'clock until 7 o'clock p. m. at the high school building. Two directors will be elected for a term of three years, and the school budget for the coming year will be voted on. According to the new law all legal voters regardless of property qualifications may vote for the directors but taxpayers only may vote on the budget.

A committee representing the five parent-teacher circles, the Greater Medford club, the Wednesday Study club, and the College Women's club has endorsed J. C. Mann and Dr. E. G. ECONOMY RECORDS OF THE CHEVROLET CARS
