LIFE TRAGEDY AS WIFE OF TITLED SOT

CHICAGO, June 20.—The Countess Eleanor Patterson Gzycka, formerly Miss Eleanor Medill Patterson of Chicago, was an all-day witness in her suit for divorce today, telling a story of neglect and unhappiness on the lonesome Russian estate of her husband, Count Josef Gzycka, that finally won from Judge Thompson the announcement that he was satisfied that she should receive her decree.

The ancestral estate of the Russian nobleman which he had described vividly before their marriage in Washington in 1904, proved to be a tumble-down, ramshackle castle, surrounded by peasants' huts and five miles from a railroad. The imposing array of servants proved to be a horde of Russian boys and girls who received no pay but their food.

She declared that her husband's life was centered on hunting, drinking and women, that his father had died insane, that the servants lived in constant terror of him and that he had married her solely for her money. All her income of \$20,000 a year had been used to maintain her titled husband, she testified.

The countess stated that she wished to be known as Mrs. Gzycka, and wanted to lose her title forever.

ABOUT 800 GIRLS DROP FROM SIGHT NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, June 20.—More than 800 girls between the ages of 19 and 20 years have disappeared from their homes here since January 1, it transpired today, coincident with an announcement by Police Commissioner Arthur Woods that he has ordered the most searching inquiry begun into police conditions as a result of the "ripper" murder of Ruth Cruger, the high school graduate whose body was found buried in a cellar under a bicycle shop belonging to Alfredo Cocchi, several days ago.

In this connection, importance is attached to the statement made by Miss Consuelo Larue that she had jumped from a window of her apartment yesterday to escape being killed by two men who attacked her because she had given information which resulted in Miss Cruger's body being found.

Whether Miss Larue had any definite connection with the Cruger case had not been definitely settled today. She is said, however, to be in possession of much valuable information regarding the white slave traffic and it is reported she is prepared to make those in the Cruger case. Word was expected today whether Cocchi, as has been requested of the Italian authorities, by the state department, has been arrested in Bologna, Italy.

Burial will be in the Jacksonville cemetery.
