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NEW COLD STORAGE PLANT PLANNED BY R. H. PARSONS

Medford is to have a new cold storage plant for green fruits. To be erected at a cost of \$60,000 at Evergreen and Twelfth streets and the railroad right of way. Construction work will be begun in a few days as plans have already been prepared for the building.

Reginald H. Parsons will erect the cold storage plant, which will be modern in every particular. The building will be leased by the Stewart Fruit company. It is expected that the plant will be ready for use in time to handle the fall crop.

As a part of the site of the structure and for right of way purposes the announcement has just been made that Mr. Parsons has purchased thru Earl Tunny three parcels of land at a cost of \$6000.

JAPAN OFFERS AID TO RESTORE RUSSIA

Japan, according to these papers, expressed the wish that Russia would soon resume its place in the ranks of the combatants.

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RUSSIANS CHEER ROOT'S SPEECH ON AMERICAN AID

PETROGRAD, June 22.—Declaring that the United States was going to fight until the world was made safe for democracy, Elihu Root, head of the American mission made his first public appearance here today. Mr. Root spoke to a large and enthusiastic Russian audience gathered under the auspices of the Russian-American committee for industrial and economic rapprochement, recently organized. Several speeches voicing the appreciation of the coming of the American mission were made by members of the society. Chief of these was that of

N. A. Pokorovsky, president of the organization, who introduced Mr. Root.

Mr. Root outlined the causes which induced America to enter the war. "Cheered, encouraged and made enthusiastic by the freedom won by Russia, who has become our ally and friend, we entered the war," said Mr. Root, "and we are going to fight until the world has been made safe for democracy—yours as well as ours—so no over-bearing military caste shall push you or us off the sidewalk."

The speech was interpreted sentence by sentence and aroused the greatest interest, his peroration being loudly applauded. The mission left tonight for Moscow, intending to return to Petrograd early next week.
