**COSTLY FIRE ON PAGE FARM, NEAR MEDFORD**  
Fire in the implement house of the Suncrest orchard Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock destroyed between \$1500 and \$2000 worth of farm and orchard implements, including a new Ford car, spray outfits, carriage, wagon, plows, harrows and many other articles of necessary ranch equipment. The Suncrest orchard of several hundred acres is the property of Dr. F. C. Page and is located about four and a half miles southeast of Medford.

The origin of the fire is unknown. Investigation led those interested to believe that a spark from a gas engine which operated a large pump probably did the work, although the engine was believed to be in first-class condition.  
The place is not supplied with fire-fighting facilities, beyond the ordinary precautionary equipment. The fire burned savagely, everything being dry as tinder, and nothing could be done to subdue it until the implement structure was destroyed.  
The large barn and fine, new residence were so near to the burning building that, for a time, it was feared that a flurry in the course of the wind might carry the flames to them. Fortunately, however, they escaped the menace.  
J. W. Dentler says the fire destroyed the entire water system equipment, which Dr. Page will at once replace.  
Insurance on the property destroyed is nominal.
