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ASHLAND PLANS GREATEST JULY 4 IN VALLEY HISTORY

The Ashland Rogue River Roundup, July 3, 4 and 5 this year, will present six world champion riders, bulldoggers and ropers—the greatest aggregation of world champion buckaroos ever gathered together at one roundup.

Klamath county and southeastern Oregon will send the pick of the range, southern Oregon will be represented by a score of riders, northern California will send its best, and for the first time at any Oregon roundup an aggregation of 25 riders, ropers and bulldoggers from Texas, Arizona and southern California will compete.

The worst buckers and the woodiest steers in the west are being gathered for the Ashland show and over 200 head of horses, steers and bulls will be in the corrals when the roundup opens on July 3.

The relay race, next to the bucking contest, promises to be the most exciting feature, with six teams, including Babe Fisher's Pendleton winners, Roy Anderson's string from Los Angeles, the Murphy string of southern Oregon race horses, Helms' fast team and two strings from Klamath county competing.

The Rogue River Roundup, while the chief feature, is only one of a score of attractions which will attract an immense crowd to the southern Oregon city for their annual Hyin Hehe, which, by the way, is Chinook Indian jargon for "heap big good time."

LOCAL EXEMPTION BOARDS SELECTED

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Announcement of local exemption boards in twenty-four states which will select candidates for the national army under the draft law were made here today.

The inspiration of these sentimental Sallies was the militant English suffragette, but in their longing for notoriety they have failed to follow the latter's worthy example, of forgetting faction when the nation is endangered and co-operating for the national defense.

The witless tactics of the Woman's Party, denounced by the National Woman Suffrage Association, has never secured votes for women and never will.

"TED" LEWIS WINS WELTERWEIGHT TITLE

DAYTON, Ohio, June 26.—"Ted" Lewis, wrestled the welterweight championship from Jack Britton here last night, winning a decision by Referee Lou Hanman, from Cincinnati, at the end of 20 rounds.

CHICAGO SHY ON RED CROSS FUND

CHICAGO, June 26.—Contributions to the war fund of the Red Cross amounted to approximately \$5,000,000, which is \$3,000,000 short of the city's \$8,000,000 goal, according to an announcement today.

Lewis was credited with winning seven rounds. Britton had a shade in five and the others were even.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 26.—Incomplete figures at the Red Cross headquarters give the total contributions as \$1,028,670.33, more than double the allotment of this city of \$500,000.

The new champion fought out a careful long-range battle, evading Britton's boring-in tactics and efforts at the body in which Britton had been able in previous matches to offset the challenger's cleverness.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 26.—Minneapolis subscribed \$750,000, this city's quota to the Red Cross fund, according to figures wired to Washington by the local committee.

Lewis did most of his fight with his left, playing to the head. Rights and lefts to the jaw slowed Britton in the eleventh and Lewis followed his advantage in the twelfth.

CONSPIRACY IN MOONEY TRIAL IS THE CHARGE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—After two hours of argument on the admissibility of evidence tending to prove that Mrs. Rena Mooney, on trial for murder, had taken part in an alleged anarchistic conspiracy, starting in 1913 and culminating in the bomb explosion which claimed 10 lives here last July, Superior Judge Seawell permitted the state to proceed with this line of testimony late today.

The ruling was made over vigorous objections of attorneys for the defense, who contended the alleged conspiracy had no direct bearing on the trial.

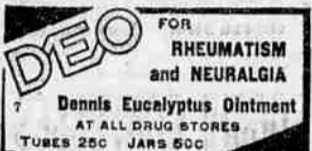
