

RED CROSS FUND NORTH COUNTY TOTALS \$21,000

Belated Subscriptions Coming in Swell County's Total to \$31,500 for Mercy Fund—Final Reports Not to Be Sent in Until Latter Part of Week So All May Subscribe.

The Red Cross war fund is expected to reach \$21,000 for Jackson county north, or a total of \$31,500 for the entire county. Last night late reports swelled the amount \$500 over the \$20,000 mark, while contributions are coming into local headquarters in such amounts today as to warrant an estimate previously not considered possible.

Final reports will not be sent to State Chairman H. L. Corbett, at Portland until the latter part of the week, thus enabling late contributors to have their donations included in the grand total.

Dartmouth Students Enlist for War
George B. Lane, retired, of Seattle, arrived in the city today to visit his daughter, Mrs. John G. Pierce, and family. Mr. Lane has just returned from attending the fiftieth anniversary reunion of his class (1867) in Dartmouth college, held in New Hampshire, where 10 out of the 16 living members were in attendance. The class originally numbered 60 students.

"A thing that impressed me during the reunion," said Mr. Lane today, "and seemed perfectly natural, was the fact that of Dartmouth's 1600 students of this past year 655 have enlisted in the various branches of the army and navy and in the marine corps. That was just the way in 1864, (and here the speaker proudly pointed to the G. A. R. button) when 24 of us boys out of the 60 students of Dartmouth college enlisted and went to the front."

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COWBOYS CAUGHT SMUGGLING LIQUOR LET OFF SCOT FREE

There was an exciting scene and scramble early last evening on the Pacific highway at the top of the Siskiyou when R. C. Carter, special liquor investigator for County Prosecutor Roberts, and W. S. Carpenter, special policeman and bone dry law investigator for Ashland, who is stationed on the highway, placed five Pendleton men under arrest for bringing liquor into the state from California.

The Pendleton men who are rough riders in Ashland for the Round-up, were in the automobile of C. V. Beeler of recent boot-legging fame, and when the two officers shouted to the car to stop and started for it, began to break to pieces 10 bottles of whisky. All but one bottle had been discovered when Porter and Carpenter reached the automobile and Porter, who is ex-chief of police of Ashland, managed to seize the last bottle from the men.

This took place at the rock crusher at the top of the mountain, about six miles this side of the California line. Bottle as Evidence.

Holding the bottle as evidence the officers informed the Pendleton men and Beeler that they were under arrest, and Porter arranged that they were to drive on to Medford in their car and lie and Carpenter would follow directly behind them in Porter's car.

Porter and Carpenter had just turned around to get into their car when three of the prisoners jumped out and escaped into the woods, but the officers managed to hold the two remaining prisoners and fasten handcuffs on them. With their prisoners they drove into Ashland and there got into communication with County Prosecutor Roberts.

On account of the absence of Justice of the Peace Taylor of Medford in Portland, and because of the fact that the Ashland has no jurisdiction outside of the city of Ashland, Mr. Roberts swore out the complaint against the prisoners before Justice of the Peace Dox of Jacksonville.

The prisoners were taken before Dox and were ordered held in \$500 bail until their hearing at 10 o'clock this forenoon.

At the hearing before Justice Taylor, Mrs. Martin testified her husband had never provided for her since her marriage, that he lived with his par-

ents and depended upon his father's pension for his sustenance, that when she secured her divorce he promised to provide \$10 a month, but had never given her a cent. She has a baby two years old and the birth of a second child is expected.

Beeler with Joe Wilson was found guilty of boot-legging by a jury in Justice Taylor's court. After sentence had been imposed on him, on strong representations that Beeler's health was failing, and on his promise to never violate the law again, the jail part of the sentence was suspended.
