RUSSIA TO SEIZE NATIONAL RESOURCES

PETROGRAD, July 7.—Minister of Agriculture Tchernoff proposed at a conference of the all-Russian congress of workmen's and soldiers' delegates a resolution based on the principle that the country's minerals, water courses and forests ought properly to belong to the whole people, who should administer them through domestic institutions, while the utilization of land ought to be assured agricultural workers under conditions insuring increased means of production and development of co-operative social life.

98 INDICTED FOR GERMAN PLOT AGAINST INDIA

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—Indictments charging conspiracy to promote a revolution against British rule in India were returned here today against ninety-eight men located in various sections of America and abroad, and ranging from millionaires and diplomats to Hindu laborers, with San Francisco as the base of operations in this country. The true bills were presented to Federal Judge W. W. Morrow by the federal grand jury after many weeks' investigation.

The indictments charge the setting on foot of a military enterprise against Great Britain. It is alleged that the undertaking had a twofold object in that it sought to overthrow British rule in India and to aid Germany by forcing England to withdraw large bodies of troops from European battle fronts and transporting them to India to put down the revolt.

It is charged that ships were outfitted and dispatched with men and supplies for the revolutionary forces. Former German consuls in Chicago, Honolulu, Shanghai, Manila and San Francisco, together with members of their staffs and former attaches of the German embassy at Washington are among those indicted.

In addition, many prominent San Francisco business men and scores of Hindus are among those indicted. Their names were placed on secret file and will not be made public until they have been arrested. Telegraphic warrants prepared by United States Attorney John W. Preston were sent broadcast to federal agents and it was explained that many arrests in various sections of the country would be made today.

United States Marshal James B. Holohan dispatched many deputy marshals immediately after the indictments had been returned to arrest members of the alleged conspiracy in San Francisco and other Pacific coast cities.

The government charges that the conspiracy dated from the outbreak of the war in 1914, was organized in Berlin and financed with German government gold.

Forty-one indictments were also returned by the grand jury in the so-called Sacramento neutrality case, which has to do likewise with German intrigues.

The indictments charge the defendants with assisting in the carrying of German warships in Pacific waters with arms, ammunition, coal and supplies, to have been used in the proposed revolution in India. It was alleged these activities extended from August 1, 1914, to January 1, 1916. Those indicted were local customs and shipping brokers and members of crews of various vessels connected with the alleged conspiracy.

FRENCH SUBMARINE SUNK BY U-BOAT

PARIS, July 7.—The submarine Ariane was torpedoed and sunk by a German U-boat in the Mediterranean July 19, according to an official announcement of the ministry of marine. All the officers and part of the crew perished. Nine men were saved.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—One rear admiral and a number of officers down to the rank of lieutenant commander will be selected soon to fill vacancies in the line of the navy. Secretary Daniels has ordered the selection board to convene in Washington July 16.

OXMAN ARRAIGNED ON PERJURY CHARGE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—Frank C. Oxman, principal witness against Thomas J. Mooney in the latter's trial for murder growing out of a bomb explosion here, was arraigned in the superior court today on a felony charge of attempting subornation of perjury in connection with Mooney's trial. After the court had over-ruled a motion to dismiss the case, Oxman's attorney, Samuel M. Shortridge, filed a demurrer to the information filed against Oxman by District Attorney Charles M. Fickert. The case was continued until next Monday morning for decision.

Oxman is accused of trying to induce F. E. Rigall of Grayville, Ill., to give false testimony against Mooney, who is under sentence of death for one of the bomb murders.

RAILROADS DROP RATE INCREASE

SALEM, Ore., July 7.—Attorneys representing the nine principal railroads operating in Oregon today advised the Public Service commission they had decided to cancel their petitions for permission to increase intrastate freight rates fifteen percent, as a result of the interstate commerce commission's recent suspension of the proposed similar increase through the nation.

Hearings on the petitions planned for next week by the commission, probably will not be held, as the four applications for increases remaining on file are from logging roads and feeders and, officials expect will be withdrawn also.

ROUND-UP TOURIST IN AUTO WRECK

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 7.—E. L. Parrot, a local capitalist, wrecked his 7-passenger car this side of Canyonville at 3 a. m. yesterday, seriously injuring at least three and bruising three others and himself. The car struck a slight ditch at a high rate of speed and turned completely over. The party was returning from the Ashland Roundup.

The seriously injured are: W. J. Weaver, proprietor of the Hotel Empqua, Roseburg, ribs broken, leg possibly fractured; Bertha Althaus of Roseburg, leg broken, shoulder either broken or dislocated; Lola Allen of Roseburg, badly torn and internal injuries; E. L. Parrot, owner and driver, badly bruised. The other occupants were "Pat" Burke, traveler for the Standard Oil company with headquarters in Portland; Floyd Miller, a stockman of Dillard, and John Burt, a traveling man, all bruised and cut. The injured are all in the Roseburg hospital.
