MEMBER FEDERAL RESERVE SYSTEM

NEW NUMBERS NOW ASSIGNED FOR ARMY REGISTRATION

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10.—For his own protection, as well as to facilitate the progress of the draft, every man in Oregon who registered for military service should make it a point to learn the new number of his registration card.

These new numbers are different from those on the green (or blue) registration certificates. True, the number on a man's certificate is the same as that written on his registration card, at the time he registered. But under orders from the war department, the numbers of all cards have been changed in the past two weeks.

The new numbers are written on the cards in red ink. They run by counties, instead of only by precincts. The county will be the unit of the draft and these new numbers are to be used in the drawings.

The first drawing will be made at Washington within the next few days. The numbers drawn will be announced to the press and also telegraphed to the adjutant general. The adjutant general will consult the files in his office, which contain duplicates of all the registration cards from the state, ascertain the names of the men belonging to the numbers, and notify the county boards.

These county boards will mail notifications to the men who have been called in their respective counties. These notifications will direct them to appear for physical examination at a date set, which must be within seven days.

PETERSON HELD ON SERIOUS CHARGE MADE BY GIRL

Oscar Peterson, familiarly known around town as "Pete" was arrested late last night on the charge of criminal assault. He was arraigned before Justice of the Police Taylor this forenoon and was held in \$1000 bond to await his preliminary hearing before Justice Taylor next Friday.

He is accused of having assaulted Mamie Davis, 14 years old, whose mother says she is but 12 years old, but who claims she is 15, in Medford on June 23, last. Peterson is about 22 years old. The girl's home is at Ashland and it is claimed she has been loitering about Medford with another young girl for several weeks.

When the Davis girl was taken before County Judge TouVelle yesterday she asked the judge if she could marry Peterson. The court committed her into the custody of the Louise home in Portland, and she left for that institution last night in custody.

JEROME. Ariz., July 10.—

Hundreds of miners and citizens, some with rifles and others with pick handles, started at sunrise today to "clean" the town of agitators whom they considered undesirable, as the result of a strike called Friday by the Metal Miners branch of the Industrial Workers of the World, which members of the International Union repudiated. No violence has been reported.

Most of the Industrial Workers of the World apparently learned of the proposed organized "drive" and left town during the night. Those who remained offered no resistance today and they were ordered aboard a special train, leaving soon for Jerome Junction.

PRESIDENT SAVES MAN DEFAMING HIM

SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—Intervention of President Wilson thru United States District Attorney John W. Preston saved Henry Ruhl, a hotel man, from a jail sentence today for making slurring remarks about the chief executive.

Ruhl was arrested and convicted two weeks ago on a charge of having shouted "hypocrite" when the president's photograph was flashed on the screen in a moving picture house. He came up for sentence today. Preston's letter, stating that the president had requested that leniency be shown, was handed to Police Judge Morris Oppenheim just as sentence was about to be pronounced. The case was dismissed.

PROBE EXCLUSION OF SOCIALIST NEWSPAPERS

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Investigation of the postoffice department's activities in excluding socialistic newspapers and periodicals from the mails, under the new espionage law is sought in a resolution introduced today by Representative London of New York socialist. Mr. London named ten papers excluded. Most of them are understood to have been placed under the ban because of anti-draft propaganda.
