

COMPANY SEVEN NOW PART OF NEW U. S. ARMY

Medford Company Mobilizes and Enters Federal Service for War—Headquarters at Armory Until Ordered to Fort Columbia, Where Men Will Undergo Training.

The Seventh company, Oregon Coast Artillery, National guard, was mustered into the federal service at 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, according to schedule. All the 109 officers and men were present, except three privates, who were absent from the city and unavoidably detained, but whose arrival is expected hourly.

Wednesday was mainly spent in getting the records of the company in thro shape. Tuesday night the out-of-town members slept in the armory on West Main street, and all who desire, whether resident or non-resident members, are taking their meals at the company mess room on Front street.

Captain Vance was unable yet definitely to state the date of the company's entrainment for Fort Columbia, Wash., to which the company has been assigned.

SOLDIERS' KITS FURNISHED BY LOCAL RED CROSS

The women of the Medford chapter of the Pacific division of the National Red Cross still continue to assemble for active work three days each week at local headquarters of the organization in the Gates building.

As an urgent call had been sent out under date of June 25 by the national headquarters for pajamas, bed shirts, bath robes, bed socks, service socks and handkerchiefs, the local chapter has been devoting most of its time to making these articles. Already the Medford chapter has shipped 302 pairs of pajamas, 129 bed shirts, 25 bath robes, 61 pairs of bed socks, 153 service socks and 114 handkerchiefs.

For Seventh Company.
The last few days, however, a portion of the chapter's membership directed its efforts entirely to the making of khaki covered kits for Medford's Seventh company, which was mustered into the federal service this morning. As the government furnishes only one kit to each corporal, which kit is intended for the collective use of eight men, the Medford women on Monday and Wednesday energetically bestirred themselves and today turned over 75 kits to Captain Vance. This almost provides a kit for every member of the company. The kits contain receptacles for a score articles essential to a soldier's needs, such as needles, thread, safety pins, etc.

The Medford chapter and its auxiliaries already have made and on hand, awaiting shipping instructions from the Pacific division headquarters, hundreds and hundreds of articles such as sheets, pillow cases and towels and thousands of smaller articles, like bandages, compresses, gauze rolls, gauze "wipes," knitted "wipes," gauze drains, gauze laparotomy pads with tapes, and muslin arm slings, all of which are almost indispensable to the surgeon and the nurse in the expeditions and efficacious treatment of the wounded soldier.

Entre County Assists.
The Ashland, Jacksonville, Central Point and Eagle Point auxiliaries of the Medford Red Cross chapter have responded generously and borne relative burdens with the mother chapter.

All the work done by the Medford chapter must be done at local headquarters, with the exception of knitting, which may be done at home. All knitted articles are for the men of the navy. Thus every week many heavy comfortable sweaters, mufflers, wristers and helmets, made at the homes of active members or sympathizers, are completed and turned into the local chapter.

LACK OF TROOPS PREVENT BIG DRIVE AGAINST RUSSIANS

COPENHAGEN, July 25.—A remarkably frank article by the Berlin correspondent of the National Tidende, passed by the foreign office censors, discussed the seamy side of the submarine campaign and the effect it has upon neutrals. It is generally recognized, he says, that the longer the campaign continues, the fewer friends Germany will have after the war.

This consideration, together with the thoughts of many billions which another six months of war would cost were the two principal factors which contributed to bringing a majority of the reichstag into line upon a bid for immediate peace. The correspondent says it is generally admitted that the effect of the campaign has been miscalculated, not regarding the amount of tonnage destroyed, but as to the time required to make its effects felt in England. The German people are still convinced that it will succeed ultimately if given time and they themselves are able to hold out.

Disregarding Gallican happenings as accidental, the correspondent says there can be no question of a big offensive owing to lack of men, as Field Marshal Von Hindenburg frankly admitted, but there is no doubt the front can hold out.

SHOOT LENINE IF CAPTURED IS RUSSIA'S INTENT

NEW YORK, July 25.—The Russian provisional government has determined to arrest Nikola Lenine, the radical socialist leader, and many of his followers, the Russian information bureau announced today. Lenine will be shot if he is convicted as a German spy, otherwise he will be isolated during the war. Lenine is declared to be a greater danger to Russia than the German armies.

Lenine, whose right name is Vladimir Ilitch Ulianoff, is described by the Russian information bureau as a "man with a record," a record which before the revolution commanded respect throughout his country.

The book "The Development of Capitalism in Russia," is regarded as one of the most valuable contributions to Russian economic literature.

Since the revolution he is believed by some to have acted as an agent of Germany in spreading a separate peace propaganda. Many of his friends declare he has become insane.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—An explosion yesterday on the submarine A-7, at Cavite, Philippine Islands, killed five men and injured three of the officers and crew. The list of killed and injured:

Injured—Chief Electrician Theodore Schnablin, Greenwood, Mo.; Airman Arthur M. Jacobs, Rigby, Idaho; Machinist's Mate J. P. Hixon. Hixon's injuries are slight. The others seriously burned.

The explosion, from a preliminary examination, appeared to be due to the ignition of gas within the ship. The cause of the ignition of the fumes has not been reported.
