KAISER'S ALLIES IN CONGRESS

GERMANY is not facing America and her allies single-handed and alone. She also has allies and friends. Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey all in their way are serviceable; the spy system is valuable.

But none of these, powerful and dangerous as they are, can be named as the kaiser's most potent allies. We can fight Austrian, Bulgarian and Turkish soldiers. We can catch spies and hang them.

They have seats in the United States congress. They are free to do their dirty work. They can fight the American people with impunity.

The question is whether there are in the presumably American senate enough American senators to force thru American laws designated to aid the American people and to help the American army and navy win a victory for the American flag.

NEW LIST READY FOR REGISTRANTS IN ARMY DRAFT

WASHINGTON, July 25.—While local selection boards were at work today assembling men of the selective draft forces, officials of the provost marshal general's office began preparing a new publication to furnish registrants with an easy method of keeping track of their status in their districts.

The new list will be issued with cross reference by number between the red ink and the drawing numbers. It will be possible for those supplied with the lists to inform any man almost instantly in what order he was drawn when he furnished his red ink number.

Registrants who expect to be called in the first draft now must watch the selection board headquarters so as to know immediately when their names are posted. The date when they are to report for physical examination will be shown at the same time.

The questions of dependents will not come up in any way until a report on a man's physical condition shows him to be suitable for military service. When that has been received the selection board will be prepared to receive affidavits on dependents of the prospective soldier.

\$150,000 CATTLE LOSS BY POISONING

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 26.—Losses approximating \$150,000 have been suffered by Klamath Falls ranchers during the last fortnight as a result of stock poisoning, according to J. M. Landell of the federal bureau of animal industry, who has been here investigating.

NORWEGIAN STEAMER HANSEAT IS SUNK

LONDON, July 26.—A German submarine operating off the Azores has sunk the Norwegian steamer Hanseat, says a Norwegian foreign office report transmitted by the Central News correspondent at Copenhagen. The crew was saved.

STRIKE BREAKERS SHIPPED TO BREAK SEATTLE STRIKE

SEATTLE, July 26.—One hundred and seventy-five additional strike-breakers arrived from New York last night and were taken to the Georgetown barn of the Puget Sound Traction, Light and Power company, whose 1600 motormen and conductors struck nine days ago for recognition of the union and higher wages.

A conference is scheduled to be held this morning between President Leonard of the traction company and representatives of the striking Seattle and Tacoma car men.

Six of the strike-breakers who arrived last night were arrested this morning as strikers of the draft registration, making ten strike-breakers in custody on this charge.

SECRET SERVICE MEN IN COMMONS

LONDON, July 26.—The attention of the speaker of the house of commons having been called today to the presence of a number of secret service men in the building, he explained that a few days ago he received information that there was likely to be some improper demonstration attempted by physical violence in the visitors' gallery.

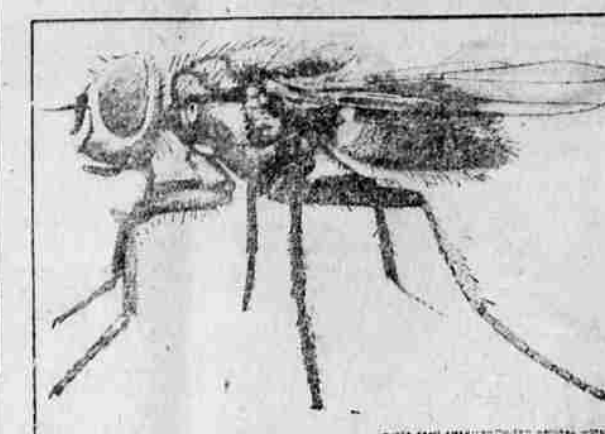

FIRST CASUALTY AMONG AMERICANS DUE TO CURIOSITY

(By the Associated Press.) WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES IN FRANCE, Wednesday, July 25.—The first field casualty among the American forces occurred today. A soldier became too inquisitive in regard to the construction of a live French bomb among the supplies brought to camp for training purposes. He extracted the safety pin in some manner, and very soon thereafter a loud explosion occurred. Fortunately for the soldier the bomb did not contain a charge of full battle strength or he would have been blown to pieces. As it was he escaped with the loss of his right hand.

At every vantage point near the camp men in khaki and men in blue could be seen today drilling, marching and digging side by side. Field maneuvers were in progress at several places, while from more secluded spots came the rattle of machine guns. Musketry practice was being held and on every hand was activity which was most impressive.

The French and American soldiers seem to enjoy their associations thoroughly. The French frankly admire the attitude of their enthusiastic pupils.

Visits to the "French front" undoubtedly will be quite frequent in the future, in order that American officers may acquaint themselves with conditions of life on the front line in its various phases, including routine as well as the actual working out of offensive and defensive plans.

CANNERY STRIKERS ARRESTED FOR RIOTING

SAN JOSE, Cal., July 26.—Twenty-five cannery strikers were arrested here early today in a riot that accompanied their attempts to force the Central California cannery to shut down. More than 800 men were dispersed by police, aided by scores of civilian deputies armed with clubs. Several of the strikers received minor injuries. The plant, located in the heart of a section known as "Little Italy," employs 550 men and women. Only 125 are at work today. Others said they would work, but feared violence at the hands of the strikers, who, the police say, threatened to burn homes of employees refusing to join in the walkout.

Between 150 and 200 women rioted several of the larger canneries last night. No attempts at violence were reported.

GOVERNOR GENERAL OF FINLAND RESIGNS

PETROGRAD, July 26.—Michael Stokovich, governor general of Finland, has resigned.

Governor General Stokovich previously announced his intention to resign, but declared the provisional government would appoint a successor to him and maintain the latter and his staff at Helsinki to show that Russia had not recognized the validity of the act passed by the Finnish parliament declaring the independence of Finland.

AMERICAN SAILING SHIP SUNK SATURDAY

LONDON, July 26.—The American sailing vessel Augustus Welt, 1221 tons, was sunk last Saturday. The crew was saved. No details of the sinking have been received.
