PUGILISTIC RANKS INVADED BY HEBREWS, WHO NOW HOLD FOUR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS



BATTLING LEVINSKY

A glance over the list of our boxing champions reveals the rather unusual fact that of seven divisions in America four of the champions are Hebrews.

A list of their real names probably would not be recognized even by the most ardent boxing fan, Benjamin Leiner, Gershon Mendilloff, Al Radolph and Battling Levinsky. Leiner, of course, is Leonard; Mendilloff is better known as Ted Lewis, and Radolph fights as Al McCoy.

They hold the lightweight, welterweight and light heavyweight crowns between them.

All of which reminds us that some of our greatest fighters have been Jewish.

Joe Choynski, than whom there was never a gamer or greater fighter fighters as the Hebrew.

Abe Attell, in his prime the most wonderful of featherweights, Jewish. The list includes Leach Cross, Kid Herman, the featherweight; Charley White, Harry Lewis and many others.

With the exception of the Irish, no race has produced so many good fighters than the Hebrew.

The present-day champions, with the exception of McCoy, are up to the average of the old days.

Leonard certainly is greater than the two champions who came before him, and unlike either Welsh or Ritchie, is willing to risk his crown now and then.

Lewis is a great fighter, shifty, clever and hard hitting. Levinsky made a name for himself as an iron man when he fought two or three times a week against the best men in his class. He won his title from Jack Dillon, in itself no easy task.

Al McCoy, generally recognized as middleweight champion on account of his one-round victory over Geo. Clip two or three years ago, manages to hang on to the title because no middleweight has been found able to knock him out in ten rounds, and Al won't play unless it's a ten-round no-decision fight.

German Official Report.

BERLIN, Aug. 6, via London.—Strong British attacks were made yesterday against the German positions between the Ypres-Menin road and the river Lys, on the Belgian front, says the official statement issued today by the German general staff. All the attacks were repulsed.

The Russians are preparing to give battle to the Austro-German forces advancing on the Russian front between the Dniester and the Pruth rivers, according to today's army headquarters' announcement. The Rumanian frontier southwest of Czernowitz is also the scene of Russian resistance. The Teuton forces have pushed to the Sereth in Bukovina, capturing Radautz, and have taken heights along the Moldava and the easterly side of the Bystritsa.
