

BIGGEST BUILDING BUILT IN 60 DAYS TO BUILD AIRSHIPS

BUFFALO, Aug. 8.—Ground has been broken by the Curtiss Aeroplane company for the biggest one-story factory building in the world—1,000,000 square feet of floor space—

This gives some idea of the size of Uncle Sam's preparations for war in the air and the pressure being put behind them.

Miracle of Construction.

Up to noon July 28 nothing had been done about this building except decide that it would have to be built if the army is to have the training camps it needs.

In thirty days half the building must be under roof and in 30 more must be ready to install machinery and begin manufacturing.

This miracle of rapid construction is made possible by a combination of good luck and American ingenuity.

Nine Buildings in One.

The sticking point in all kinds of construction now, of course, is steel. The steel trust is not accepting private contracts for delivery under 12 months and some independents want even more time.

It happened that the firm which has taken the Curtiss contract had previously arranged to build nine large factory buildings of uniform size and had secured the steel girders and beams for them.

This is where American ingenuity came in. "Why not give up the idea of putting up a building of conventional type?" the engineers asked.
