FARMERS' LEAGUE PROVES UNPATRIOTIC

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Aug. 10.—The Non-Partisan league of North Dakota, a farmers' organization, and the Industrial Workers of the World have prevented North Dakota from doing her full share toward filling the ranks of the regular army, according to a statement made here today by Lieutenant William Anshelm, chief recruiting officer for North and South Dakota. Lieutenant Anshelm also declared that the influence of the I. W. W. had hindered somewhat recruiting in South Dakota. A marked change in sentiment, however, the officer declared, would result when the first drafted men are called into the service.
