German Report.

BERLIN, via London, Aug. 23.—In the fighting yesterday in the region of Verdun, the German general headquarters staff today reports the French gained a footing only in a German foremost trench on a small front to the west of the Vacherenville-Beaumont road.

British Successful.

BRITISH FRONT IN FRANCE AND BELGIUM, Aug. 23 (by the Associated Press).—Definite success can be recorded this morning for the latest British operations east and northeast of Ypres, on the Belgian front, which yesterday were surrounded by much uncertainty owing to the fierceness of the resistance offered by the Germans.

Surrounding Lens.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The British have advanced their lines southwest of Lens, the war office announces. An attack east of Langemarck was repulsed. British posts in the neighborhood of Lombartzyde, Belgium, were raided by the Germans.

CANADIAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, Aug. 23 (by Canadian Press, Ltd.).

Southwest of Lens at 3 o'clock this morning, after a short but intense bombardment, the Manitoba troops attacked the Green Grassier, a huge heap of put refuse on the north bank of the Souchez river, by which our advance into Lens from the south was barred.

The Fosse St. Louis, which consists of a tangle of pithead machinery shot to pieces by many bombardments, was also attacked.
