Sergeant James Brooks has received word that only 21 more recruits can be enlisted in the marine corps in Portland district between now and September 20, which means that of this number Medford's apportionment will be only two or three men.
Slim prospects of much forest highway work this year, including the Crater Lake highway under the Barrett-Benn bill for state co-operation with the federal government are held out by State Highway Commissioner E. J. Adams of Eugene, who spent Monday in Medford inspecting highway conditions.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—Trial of Frank C. Oxman, of Durkee, Or., accused of attempted subornation of perjury in connection with the bomb murder trial of Thomas J. Mooney, was set by Superior Judge Frank H. Dunne today for September 5.
Oxman was a material witness against Mooney, who is under sentence of death for one of the murders resulting from a bomb explosion here last summer which claimed ten lives.
F. E. Bigall, of Grayville, Illinois, charged that Oxman sought to induce him to give false testimony against Mooney.
