CAR SERVICE IN FRISCO RESUMED

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 4.—Car service on the United railways, suspended yesterday as a precautionary measure against possible labor day demonstrations, incident to the strike of 1750 of the company's platform men, was resumed today.

Settlement of the differences between the corporation and its former employees, who walked out on August 13, prior to demands for higher wages, shorter hours and recognition of their new union, seemed brighter today in view of the unceasing efforts of city officials and the county grand jury to bring about arbitration.

The Municipal railway took in \$101,428 more in the first 22 days of the United railways strike than in the 22 days preceding, according to an official announcement today.

Receipts of the municipal road in August were highest in its history, except for the month of August, 1915, when the Panama-Pacific exposition was in progress.

ILLINOIS TROOPS CHARGE RIOTERS

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Sept. 4.—Charging with fixed bayonets, Illinois guardsmen last night dispersed a mob of more than 1000 street car strike sympathizers, who half an hour before had wrecked four street cars and were then attacking the headquarters of the railroad company, intent on wrecking and ransacking the building. Dispersed by the soldiers from the corner of the main business section where the cars had been attacked, the crowd headed for the offices of the railroad company and the Springfield Gas & Electric company, a subsidiary corporation.

Six soldiers on guard at the building held the crowd in check for some time, but bolder ones in the mob finally started hurling bricks at the plate-glass windows, riddling the front of the building. As reinforcements arrived and charged them with the butts of their guns, the rioters fled in confusion, a few of them being trampled upon, but none seriously hurt. No shots were fired by the soldiers.

IGNORE COLOR LINE IN ARMY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—How color lines have been ignored in the assignment of negro troops in the drafted sections of the national army is revealed in general orders issued today, showing the war department's intention to apportion the negro troops evenly where possible in all cantonments. The order provides that in every cantonment there shall be one negro infantry regiment where sufficient personnel is available.

Protests have been made against quartering negro troops in certain parts of the south, but no modification has been made. The order is taken as an indication of what the war department will do in disposing of similar regiments in national guard camps.

CAPACITY HOUSE FOR BENEFIT FOR COMPANY SEVEN

TEXAS STATE FUNDS JOCKEYED BY BANK

AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 4.—Testimony that on one occasion \$72,239 of state funds deposited in the Temple State bank was without protection was given by H. F. Blum, assistant cashier of the bank, today, in the impeachment trial of Governor James E. Ferguson before the senate, constituting the high court. Blum said that on June 30, 1917, the total of state funds recorded in the bank was \$356,338, while the bank had on deposit in other institutions \$238,216 and cash on hand of \$45,883.

After presenting these figures Blum admitted that on more than one occasion state funds had been used to cover the bank's daily balance.

DRILL CONTEST ADDED FEATURE FOR COUNTY FAIR

A committee headed by E. W. Lilegran, of the Southern Oregon Mining bureau, and S. L. Sandry of the Blue Ledge forces, has arrangements well toward completion to stage an "added attraction" at the Jackson County fair. The new event, which probably will be scheduled for Thursday, September 20, will consist of several matches between mining drill men, and a prize of \$160 to the winning team is intended to be awarded. Second and third prizes will be announced later.

Each team, which consists of two men, will drill for 15 minutes, the hammerman and the drillman exchanging their respective tools every 30 seconds, which these experts do without the slightest confusion, and with no loss of time. The drilling will be done in hard granite. The team that has the deepest hole drilled in the granite at the end of 15 minutes will be entitled to the first prize.

The drilling meet is intended for contestants from Southern Oregon and Northern California, although no barrier against men from any other district will be raised. Already entries from Takilma, Waldo and Yreka have been received.

HUNDRED SHIPS ADDED TO TONNAGE

LONDON, Sept. 4.—Commenting on the rapid increase to shipbuilding to offset the losses from the submarine campaign, the Cardiff correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph company says that two supplements published by Lloyd's shipping register show that between June 8 and July 17 more than 100 steamers, of which 63 are British, were added to the register. Most of these vessels are of large tonnage. The rate of construction is understood to be increasing rapidly.

PRESIDENT OPPOSES JOINT WAR BOARD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—President Wilson still is vigorously opposed to legislation by congress for the creation of a joint congressional committee on the conduct of the war. Such a proposal was defeated in the senate several weeks ago, but has been revived in an amendment to the new bond bill. The president has written to several members of congress expressing his opposition.

DYNAMITER OF PUBLISHER'S HOUSE COMMITS SUICIDE

MONTREAL, Sept. 4.—After being surrounded at LaChute yesterday by a posse of police and citizens, and fighting desperately until wounded, Joseph LeDuc, alias Handfield, one of several bandits accused of dynamiting the home of Lord Athelstan, publisher of the Montreal Star, committed suicide by firing a bullet into his head.

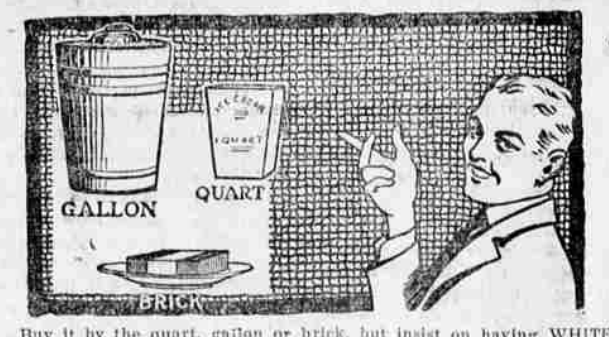
Henry Monette, alias Girard, and J. A. Tremblay, alleged dynamiters, and companions of LeDuc, were being pursued tonight by a posse of special police from LaChute, and were said to be headed toward the Laurentian mountains.

Eli A. LaLumiere, the young anti-conscriptivist speaker, who has assisted the authorities in hunting down the criminals who attempted to murder Lord Athelstan and his family at Carterville, has confessed, it is alleged, that LeDuc and Monette had also planned to shoot Lord Athelstan but LaLumiere secretly removed the cartridges from their revolvers just before they started on their murderous mission.

The plot to kill Lord Athelstan failed because Eli LaLumiere, one of the 11 men now under arrest in connection with the conspiracy, removed the cartridges from the revolvers of the men who went to waylay him.

The police say they now have clues which indicate that the plots were hatched by a person with strong German affiliations.
