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CITY COUNCIL ATTENDS TO MINOR BUSINESS AFFAIRS

The city council met in regular session Tuesday night, with Councilmen Davis, Hargrave, Keene and Carkin present, Mayor Gates presiding. Keene and Carkin were late, and as their presence was necessary to obtain a quorum, the proceedings did not begin until after 9 o'clock. Councilmen Emmons and Gaddis were absent, Gaddis being on a vacation.

The question of a municipal wood supply was not brought up, and another holdover matter, that of the city firemen's demand for an increase in wages from \$70 to \$80 per month, was, on suggestion of Mayor Gates, referred to the fire and finance committees, and it is expected these committees will make their respective reports at the next meeting of the council. The fire committee on the merits of the firemen's request, and the finance committee on the ability of the municipality to meet their demand.

To Revoke Licenses. City Attorney Mears was instructed by the city fathers to prepare an amendment to city ordinances that will confer on the city council authority to promptly revoke the license of any billiard or pool hall, or card room or jitney or jitney that has been convicted of violation of the liquor laws.

This prospective amendment was suggested by the fact that the city recently found itself without legal power to revoke the license of a billiard hall, the owner of which pleaded guilty to bootlegging, and the nullification of this license had to be executed by the county attorney. As the ordinance now stands such a license may be voided only after conviction on a gambling charge.

The fire chief was instructed by the council to make a list of every "shack" and dilapidated building in the city, and to condemn and have destroyed those that are a fire menace, and to have declared a nuisance and razed those that are unsightly. These shells of structures, the lawgivers hold, are ugly, unwholesome and unsanitary, and have degenerated into temporary abodes for itinerants and

the less fortunate members of society.

Minor Business. Attorney E. E. Kelly, representing Thomas Flynn, proprietor of the Medford Electric company, pleaded before the council Flynn's right to use a distillate pump in front of his place of business on Main street. It appeared that Flynn already has in use a gasoline pump. He wanted also to install a distillate pump, but probably half the council has objected to any more stationary pumps on Main streets. Flynn, it seems, then bought a portable pump from which to feed his distillate, and his legal representative declared that he had permission to install it from Acting Fire Chief Marks, although it developed that such permission could cover only the fire-emergency aspects of the practice. Some members of the council alleged that Flynn has not always moved his

portable pump back into his store after serving a customer. The whole matter was thoroughly threshed out, but no action was taken and the problem was held in abeyance. Mayor Gates, who, on a tie, may vote, is said to have no objection to the portable pump.

H. F. Wilcox was granted permission to conduct a pool room, to be known as "The Oaks."

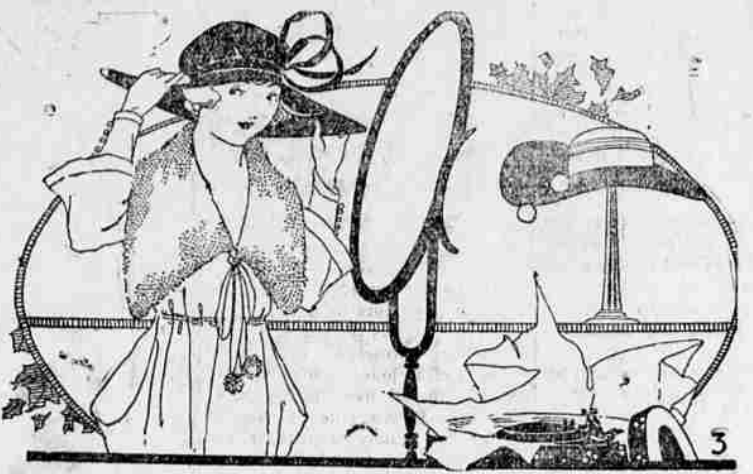
A report of the finance committee was submitted by City Recorder Alford, adopted by the council and warrants were ordered issued to cover salaries and other municipal obligations.

LABOR IS BEHIND THE GOVERNMENT IN WAR. MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 5.—Labor representatives from all parts of the country and many members of the socialist party, tonight are ready for
