The great bulk of volume was in good but unfinished steers which sold between \$8.00 to \$9.00. Some excellent cows were offered and changed hands between \$7.00 to strong demand for good top steers, Trading was prompt and active; all stock offered had changed hands at noon, altho the volume was so heavy that weighing continued steadily until closing time.
