The last spray recommendations issued recommended that spraying should be discontinued by the 25th of August. It is now time for another spray and it should be on the trees by the 15th of this month...

One step towards reducing the worms for the coming year is to gather all fallen fruit as soon as each tree is picked and remove it from the orchard. It should be disposed of by feeding it to hogs, seeing it to the cannery or vinegar factory...

BRITISH RECRUIT VOLUNTEERS FOR SERVICE ABROAD

With the lively co-operation of the administration and of the war department, the British recruiting mission with headquarters in New York city has started a nation-wide campaign to get Britishers and Canadians in this country to enlist for the war.

Men are eligible for enlistment between the ages of 18 and 45, and in certain cases up to the age of 56. Enlistment will be for the duration of the war and six months after the termination of hostilities, unless sooner discharged.
