

ENEMY TRADING BILL CONSIDERED BEFORE SENATE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The senate today began consideration of the trading-with-the-enemy bill, already passed by the house.

Among the principal provisions written into the bill by the senate commerce committee were those which would permit the abrogation of contracts made prior to America's entrance into the war and the insurance section which would permit enemy-controlled fire insurance companies to remain in operation under certain restrictions, one of which would prohibit the sending of funds out of this country by them.

Because of differences between the secretaries of the treasury and commerce regarding the extent of the powers conferred on them by the bill, the committee amended it so that full administrative authority is placed in the president.

At yesterday's sitting of the council of soldiers' and workmen's delegates, they again urged that all power should pass into the hands of the socialists. It was resolved at the meeting, however, that Premier Kerensky should be supported unconditionally.

Capital Is Quiet.

Monday night the capital was quiet and traffic was normal.

General Savonkoff has taken over the office of military governor of Petrograd in place of General Vasilkovsky, resigned. General Savonkoff has addressed a reassuring proclamation to the population stating that all necessary measures were being taken for the defense of the fatherland and of freedom.

General Klembovsky, the commander on the Riga front, has not yet been commissioned chief of all the armies of Russia, which post was refused by General Lokonsky, on account of the impossibility of Klembovsky reaching grand headquarters.

Kerensky Asks Directory.

Explaining to the council of soldiers and workmen Premier Kerensky's reasons for desiring the appointment of a directory, M. Skobelev, the minister of labor, said the provisional government was incapable of dealing with the situation, as some of its members were Germanophile and at an hour when the country was threatened with disaster the premier believed it necessary to take the power into his own hands and get rid of the present government.

The arrest of certain persons, including Vladimir Pansikovitch, a well-known reactionary under the old regime, is expected.

No particular animation was noticeable yesterday until the evening, when the evening newspapers made their appearance and were eagerly bought up.

May Call Assembly.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 11.—Members of the Russian provisional government today discussed as an alternative or complement to a directory, the formation of a permanent national assembly on the lines of the Moscow conference which is to be summoned immediately.

In conversation with the Associated Press today, leaders of the Petrograd council of deputies declared that the provisional government's trump card was that the railroad employees were entirely on its side and that obduracy by General Korniloff would result in a general strike, depriving Korniloff of all supplies and of all means of imposing his will on the rest of Russia.

Gutchkoff With Revolt.

Alexander J. Gutchkoff, the Octoberist leader, who formerly held the position of president of the duma, chief of the munitions bureau and minister of war and navy and interim, has gone over to General Korniloff. M. Gutchkoff had left Petrograd on Saturday for the Russian field headquarters.

Ambassadors Meet.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 10.—(Delayed.)—A council of all ambassadors, including those representing neutral countries, was held this afternoon, at which a situation was discussed about which all information was later refused. Following the meeting the ambassadors from the entente nations held a separate conference.

Secretary Wilson Ill.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Secretary Wilson is recovering from a severe attack of ptomaine poisoning, which has kept him from his desk for a week.

SERBIA CRUCIFIED BY HUNS



This rare photograph, one of the few that have come out of Serbia, reveals the horrible Austrian and Bulgarian cruelties. The original was found on the body of Bernard Wewersich, German officer, who was killed on the Monastir front. He snaphotted the gruesome scene as a souvenir of his stay in Serbia. It shows a sextuple execution of Serbians in the presence of the Austro-Hungarian army. Members of the Serbian parliament identified the place as the railroad station at Krushevatz and recognized one of the victims, the second in order from the right, as M. Mihayle, mayor of the village of Lazaritzia.

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object, of course, is to denationalize them and to utilize their labor.

Death on Gallows.

"In the part of Serbia under the control of the Austrian archduke, Frederick, we learn from the Beogradskoe Novine, official organ of the Austrian, that death on the gallows is provided for persons, men or women, in whose possession are found arms or explosives, for those who assist prisoners to escape, for having more food in the house than is permitted by the military, for retaining copper utensils after orders to give them up, for conveying letters other than one's own.

"Not long ago Sabin Yelechitch, a wealthy merchant of Brus, was hanged for refusing to reveal where private property of the Serbian crown prince had been deposited.

"In the retreat of the Serb armies, the men buried arms and ammunition on farms. When the Austrians find these things, they often hang the farmers, utterly ignorant of the whereabouts of these implements of war.

On Trivial Pretense.

"People have been hanged because they either could not or would not reveal where Serbian state archives were hidden.

"There is another and more refined way of ruining the survivors: goods and money, either thru taxes or other methods of robbery under color of military law.

"The Austrians and Bulgars change and that is by seizing all their the laws on taxation and customs, introduce new monopolies, abolish the moratorium, and force the inhabitants to subscribe to their war loans and make donations to their Red Cross. The evident aim is to bring about the economic ruin of the Serbs.

"Altho Serbian money in the open market is of more exchange value than Austrian and Bulgarian, the conquerors have arbitrarily reduced it by one-half, thus at one blow depriving Serbians of one-half of their savings. In many instances, Serbian money has been taken by force from the people and Austrian money substituted and, of course, not on equal terms.

"The Bulgars have gone a step farther. Whenever a Serb has left the country they have declared his estate 'ownerless property,' and sold it for the benefit of the Bulgarian treasury."

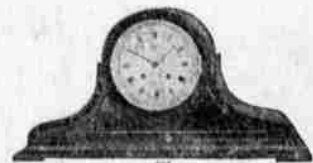

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It Will Run in
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CRISIS IN RUSSIA DUE TO SINISTER GERMAN INTRIGUE

LONDON, Sept. 11.—The Russian crisis overshadows all else in the news and editorial columns of the morning newspapers that "Germany may enjoy the position of knowing that her sinister intrigues have produced a cataclysm in the revolution, which in whatever its other results may consist, must, as we continue to believe, ultimately destroy and eradicate predominance in Russia," says the Morning Post.

The Times says the outlook is dark and that it affects the war on every front, "for the allies begin to realize that even in the most favorable circumstances the revival of the Russian military efficiency is bound to be remote."

The Times declares that General Korniloff is not a traitor and says that if his ultimatum to the Petrograd authorities on Saturday was tantamount to dictatorship, it was ev-

idently because he felt there was no alternative left.

The Chronicle says it is obvious that General Korniloff "would scarcely have put a pistol at the government's head on Saturday unless he believed he could fire it," and adds that "the immediate future should show whether he can."
