

PAINLEVE FORMS NEW MINISTRY OF ALL PARTIES

Three Former Premiers and Sixteen
Former Cabinet Ministers Among
New Coalition Ministry for France
—Rene Viviani and Albert Thomas
Eliminated—Ribot Added.

PARIS, Sept. 14.—The new French cabinet contains a new ministry, at first called the ministry of propaganda, but later changed to minister of missions abroad. Owing to the absence of Franklin Bonillon, the new post is not listed with the other ministry designations in the official Journal. The new ministry consists of fifteen titular ministers, four ministers of state and eleven under secretaries.

The new ministers are divided among five senators, eleven deputies and two, Louis Loucheur and Albert Clavelle, do not belong to parliament. The eleven under secretaries are also members of the chamber of deputies.

Leaders of All Parties.

Sixteen of the new cabinet members have been ministers or under secretaries in previous cabinets, and three are former premiers. The political groups represented in the new ministry do not include the unified socialists. Premier Painleve represents the socialist-republican group, while the socialist radicals have three members, the radical left three, the republican union of the senate two, and the radical republic union seven members. Seven members of the Ribot ministry retain places in the new cabinet. The most noted, perhaps, of the Ribot ministry to go are Rene Viviani and Albert Thomas.

The Ribot ministry failed Sunday night when M. Thomas withdrew and Professor Paul Painleve followed him, being unwilling to remain in a cabinet where the unified socialists were not represented. Professor Painleve's first combination met the same fate Tuesday night, when the unified socialists also refused to co-

operate with him, principally because Alexandre Ribot remained as a minister.

List of Ministers.

The new ministry formed by Professor Painleve, who, in addition to becoming premier, will continue to act as minister of war, follows:

Foreign affairs, Alexandre Ribot; minister of justice, Raoul Peret; minister of the interior, Jules Steeg; minister of marine, Charles Chautet; minister of munitions, Louis Loucheur; minister of finance, Louis Loeuillet; minister of colonies, Rene Besnard; minister of transports, Albert Clavelle; minister of education, Daniel Vincent; minister of labor, Andre Nere; minister of commerce, Etienne Clementel; minister of agriculture, Fernand David; minister of provisions, Maurice Long; minister for missions abroad, Franklin Bonillon.

Four ministers of state who also are members of the war council are: Louis Barthou, Leon Bourgeois, Paul Doumer and Jean Dupuy; under secretary for medical services, Justin Godart; under secretary of aviation, Jacques L. Dumesnil; under secretary of general administration, M. Monnier; under secretary for military justice and pensions, Pierre Masse; under secretary for munitions, J. L. Breton; under secretary of the interior (in charge of inventions), Victor Reytal; under secretary of finance, Paul Reneroy; under secretary of commerce, Paul Morel; under secretary of merchant marine and transport, M. Demonzie; under secretary of blockade, Albert Meunier; under secretary for fine arts, Albert Dalimier.

MILK SITUATION BEFORE FOOD BOARD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Representatives of 100,000 organized milk producers today accepted a proposal by the food administration that they make only month to month contracts with distributors pending a promised reduction in the prices of cattle feed. Semi-annual contracts will expire in a short time.

Food administration officials believe that stabilized grain prices and limited profits for millers will cut feed prices before January first. They look for a general readjustment of all prices.

INCREASE IN PAY DENIED FIREMEN BY CITY COUNCIL

The city firemen will not receive the raise in pay asked for. This decision was reached by a conference held by the city council last night. The matter will be formally disposed of publicly at the regular council meeting next Tuesday night, and unless the council changes its mind on the matter at that time it is probable that at least two of the firemen will resign.

It is said that three of the councilmen are opposed to raising the pay of the firemen from \$75 to \$80, the same as is paid the policemen. Dr. Keene is opposed to the raise on general principles, and the other two councilmen base their opposition on the ground that the state of the city's finances will not stand the raise.

The firemen not only claim that they should be paid as much at least as the policemen, but should be paid more, as they are on duty twenty-four hours a day, and the policemen work in eight-hour shifts. Mayor Gates favors the raise in pay for the firemen.

Several other city employees are also disgruntled over their pay, but see no chance of getting a raise, and like the firemen, are keeping an eye out for more lucrative positions.

The city council also discussed the proposed shack ordinance which will be introduced for passage next Tuesday evening. This ordinance will provide for the razing of all unsightly shacks and old abandoned structures throughout the city.

AMERICAN AVIATOR KILLED IN FRANCE

PARIS, Sept. 14.—Corporal Meeker, an American aviator, was killed at Pau on Tuesday in an airplane accident due to his motor stalling, the Herald announces today.

Attached to the La Fayette flying squadron in France is William Henry Meeker, formerly of the Harvard Crimson, who sailed from New York in May to join the aviation forces in France and whose arrival at Bordeaux was reported May 31.

"SAVAGE" DIVISION DICKERS FOR TERMS FOR SURRENDER

VILLAGE OF POPOVO, NEAR

TSARSKOE-SELO, Russia, Thursday, Sept. 13.—Having obtained the only permit issued by the chief of the Petrograd district staff to a newspaperman since the beginning of General Korniloff's revolt, the Associated Press correspondent early this morning arrived at this village, which is the headquarters of the staff of a rifle regiment of the guard which, with two other rifle regiments, is engaged in holding the front opposite the famous "savage" division. The situation here is as follows:

Altho all danger of an armed struggle is now excluded, the "savage" division still is not agreed to surrender on the terms granted by the provisional government last night but it has formally pledged itself not to attack the Kerensky forces. With its artillery and machine gun detachments the division, which is composed of tribesmen from the Caucasus, is quartered peacefully in villages south of this place without entrenchments, outposts, sentries or reconnoitering detachments.

Passing within 40 yards of the Popovo church are the governmental lines but the Kerensky forces also have no intention of attacking, as negotiations are proceeding and there is a prospect of a settlement being reached before nightfall.

Russian emissaries and officers constantly are passing into the camp of the Caucasians carrying proclamations signed by General Filonenko, the supreme commissioner, advising the troops of the "savage" division to

abandon their officers and march to Tsarskoe-Selo. Likewise tribesmen from the division all the time are coming into Popovo with plans for a settlement.

SAYS AUSTRIA CAN'T LAST THROUGH COMING WINTER

GENEVA, Sept. 14.—The Freie Zeitung of Berne publishes an article from a high Austrian official, who recently traveled through several sections of this country, in which the writer states that Austria-Hungary cannot hold out the coming winter, owing to economic reasons, as both soldiers and civilians will be starved. He gives several reasons, notably the almost complete destruction of the crop in the richest regions of Hungary by the cold and the heavy rain, while 300,000 tons of Rumanian cereals could not be transported owing to lack of rolling stock, which first of all, is utilized for military purposes. In the meantime, he says, the necessities of life are mounting to enormous prices.

ly is taking necessary measures to restore the interrupted economic and social life and altho the fundamental difficulties which inspired General Korniloff's adventure remain, hopes are expressed that the cabinet which is now under reconstruction will in

future show greater vigor and decision.

Last night the director of communication, M. Liverovsky, was able to announce that the railroad communication had been restored on the Warsaw, Moscow-Windau and other interrupted lines which all today resumed the transport of freight.

Premier Kerensky tonight issued an order giving to the military governor of Petrograd who temporarily is General Peltchinsky, after General Sevinkoff's resignation, special powers with regard to the press.

Petrograd Calm.
Petrograd has entirely recovered its calm, a remarkable effect of the suppression of the revolt being that the panicky rush from the capital, caused by the fall of the Baltic port of Riga has ceased and the railroad stations have recovered their normal appearance. On the Bourse where only private deals are transacted, there was a sharp rise in securities.

From Moscow it is reported that refugees have begun returning to Petrograd. Doubtful elements in the provinces who certainly would have backed General Korniloff had he succeeded in his revolt, are passing resolutions in support of the provisional government and in condemnation of the revolt.

The new cabinet is rapidly progressing towards completion the friction again has arisen between the constitutional democrats and the socialists.
