THE PAPAL ATTITUDE

THE NEW YORK WORLD prints a copyrighted interview of a Catholic diplomat, long resident in Rome, with the Pope, which sheds light upon the pontiff's temperament and attitude upon the war and partly explains some of the sentiments of his peace note.

The interviewer declares that the Pope is not in the least Germanophile, but that distrust of Russia has always been an obsession of his. His motives are thus summarized:

- 1. A desire to obtain a seat at the peace conference, at which the question of temporal power may be reconsidered by the principal world powers. 2. Fear to offend powerful Roman Catholics, thereby incidentally giving an impetus to the German modernism school at Munich, which before the war had become restive and undisciplined. 3. Fear lest the Austrian empire, the greatest of Catholic powers, should suffer shipwreck.

The Pope dwelt upon the treatment accorded Catholic priests at Lemberg by the Russians, but excused the shooting of Catholic priests in Belgium by Germans, stating that "war produces horrors everywhere."

It is indeed remarkable that the holy see has witnessed the destruction of the Catholic countries of Belgium, Poland, Serbia and Armenia without voicing a protest, that the atrocities and barbarities of German frightfulness and violations of justice and humanity have never brought a word of condemnation.

THE TURNING POINT

THE overwhelming vote for the creation of an irrigation district Saturday shows that at last the landowners of the valley realize that in irrigation lies salvation.

Those of us who have worked, watched and waited for the valley to wake up to its greatest need, who have for years seen in irrigation the key to unlock the door of opportunity and make the valley a garden of prosperity, are particularly gratified that the first step has been taken in the right direction, and sincerely hope, now that a start has been made, progress will be rapid, and ere long the entire district will be under water.

We live under a democratic government, and those who have opposed irrigation and the creation of an irrigation district should cheerfully accept the verdict of the majority and work with them to secure the best results, so that the best possible water system may be constructed.

The creation of an irrigation district marks the turning point in the valley. Optimism will replace pessimism, enterprise oust reaction, hope will drive out despair, and with irrigation an actuality, the entire economic and industrial life of the valley change for the better as prosperity replaces hard times.

A great deal of the pro-German activity is useless detail, which keeps the United States operatives busy, but leads to nothing startling. The only thing Bielaski has ever said about the German spy system is that it is "very persevering."

extensive walkout in the history of the Pacific coast, follow: Navy Work Tied Up. Number of strikers approximately 25,000.

Unions involved, twenty-five. Contract value of work killed up, about \$150,000,000 in navy and freight vessel construction, airplane engines and machinery for the government, and private contracts.

Number of plants affected, approximately 100. Wages demanded by various crafts, machinists \$6; molders \$6; boiler-makers \$6; blacksmiths \$6; pattern-makers \$7; stationary engineers \$6; stationary firemen \$120 a month; sheet metal workers \$6; copper-smiths \$6; electrical workers \$6; ship riggers \$5; steamfitters \$6; shipwrights, caulkers and joiners \$6; structural iron workers \$8; oilers, condenser and pumpmen \$110 a month; pile drivers \$8; ship painters \$6 and ship fitters \$6.

Street Rioting Follows. Sporadic street rioting closely followed the walkout of iron workers and shipbuilders, one group of whom attacked a United Railways street car and beat two substitutes, replacing striking platform men, according to police reports. A riot call was sent to the Mission police station. Patrolmen dispersed the crowd with drawn revolvers.

Minor disturbances were reported in the Porters, the industrial district where the Union Iron works is located.
