

TEXAS GOVERNOR DENIES PROFITING AT STATE COST

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 17.—"I call upon the God of Heaven to strike me dead before this assemblage if I do not speak the truth when I say that I never intended to make a nickel, even a cent, off the state money in the Temple State bank."

This was the statement of James E. Ferguson today while testifying at his impeachment trial before the senate high court, regarding deposit of some \$40,000 of Canyon City normal insurance money in the Temple state bank in which he was a large stockholder.

Denies All Charges.

The governor took the stand soon after the senate high court convened today and by noon had testified regarding three of the 21 charges against him. W. A. Hanger, the governor's chief counsel, took up the charges in order. The three considered this morning were that the governor applied \$5600 of Canyon City normal money to a personal obligation; that he deposited Canyon City normal money in the Temple State bank for profit and that he borrowed from the Temple institution in excess of the limit allowed by law, even tho, as governor, he was sworn to enforce the law.

The governor said he was absolutely unaware until the July grand jury investigation, that the \$5600 had been charged to his official account. He was indicted by the grand jury for alleged misappropriation of state funds.

Intended No Profit.

The governor said he never intended to profit from the deposits in the Temple bank. Regarding the third charge, he said, when his "vorenline" grew large, he consulted with the Temple bank officials and steps were taken to adjust his affairs.

The governor introduced his testimony with a narrative of his career from the time he started as a cotton picker and mule driver, until he became the state's chief executive.

Hjalmar Branting, the Swedish socialist leader, was the chief speaker at a meeting which was attended by 15,000 socialists. At the conclusion of the address the following resolution was passed:

"Events of the last few days show how the leading circles of Germany ruthlessly have misused the careless confidence of the two Swedish governments which directed the policy of Sweden during the war period."

"This meeting therefore, emphasizes the determination to maintain a correct attitude which is felt by all the Swedish people. We realize with indignation and humiliation that our good name has been jeopardized by the conduct of a few men. Obviously the nation's fortunes cannot continue in the hands of these few men who favor such systems and methods."

WHY GERMANY'S FLYING HATE SHOWERS LONDON, AND SPARES PARIS



This map helps explain why London, farther distant, suffers more than Paris, from German air raids.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—London and all England are at the mercy of periodic visitations of frightfulness from German air raiders.

Paris and France are practically immune.

Why? Is it because British airmen are inferior and French airmen superior? Is the Kaiser venting his spleen on the "arch enemy," England, and showing mercy to France?

Or has the Kaiser some great strategic plan? No! Geography, and geography alone. Look at the map.

From the German airplane bases at Zebruggue and Ostend on the Belgian coast to London is 130 miles, a little more than an hour's flight. From the German front to Paris is only 75 miles.

But in the flight to London the first 90 miles is over the water, with little danger of attack and no danger of detection except wireless messages from patrol boats and seaplanes.

Even if the German air raiders are sighted the second they cross the coast line, there are only 20 minutes to mobilize British airplanes to repel the attack. This would be enough if it were certain London would be the point of attack; but there are scores of other points besides London—munitions plants, army and navy barracks, and industrial towns—within easy striking distance.

Generally the German bombs have done their deadly work before the British planes can locate and engage them, and then it is a running fight with all the odds against the pursuers.

Now look at the French map. It is only 40 minutes' flight to Paris; but see how conditions differ.

The second a squadron of German planes takes the air, they are spotted

by the French or British fliers, who can mobilize at any point on the front an airplane squadron of equal strength in less time than it takes to tell it.

Then the German planes must cross the Franco-British trenches and run the gauntlet of anti-aircraft guns. Then for 75 miles they must fly over French soil with the alarm spread by telegraph and hundreds of French planes taking the air from the reserve airdromes and flying schools all the way to Paris.

A fine chance they have of reaching Paris in sufficient numbers to do any damage! And a great chance to return to tell the tale!
