

ASHLAND TO FEED 7300 SOLDIERS IN 14 MEALS, 5 DAYS

Ashland and Roseburg will each feed 7300 troops on their way to American lake. Grants Pass will feed 1443 and Medford none. Why, no one knows, unless it was lack of prompt acceptance of the offer and too many questions by the committee in charge. The only reply to these queries was a change of schedule.

For five days the trains, each containing about 500 soldiers of the new national army, totalling 10,000 drafted men, will pass thru Medford. At Ashland the first meal will be served at noon Thursday. A second meal will be furnished at 2 p. m. On Friday there will be one meal at 1 p. m. and one at 5 p. m.; Saturday, one at 6 a. m., one at 7 p. m. and one at 7:30 p. m.; Sunday, one at 6 a. m., one at noon and one at 7:30 p. m.; Monday, one at 6 a. m. and one at 7 p. m. Three hundred will be fed each meal at the Depot hotel and the other 200 at other restaurants.

The cities named as stopping places, with the number of men to be provided for, the number of times meals are to be served and the number of days in which the hospitality will be required are given below:

"Can we permit German autocracy and militarism to remain as a constant menace to the peace and tranquility of the world? Can there be any compromise with this question, now that millions of men have died to make it impossible? Men may cry 'Peace, peace,' but there can be no peace so long as 'kultur,' under autocratic interpretation and direction, remains a vital force in the world—so long as any great and aggressive nation of men are made to believe they possess a superiority which entitles them to subject others to their will and their self-constituted rulers are permitted perpetually to plot and plan to that purpose.

There may be some who are not aware what may happen to future generations if this generation be permitted to live in peace, nor now humiliating the peace under which they live, but, thank God, in this splendid democracy of ours they can constitute a very small minority, and in the ranks of business their number is negligible. Let us make this number infinitesimal by such united action that every impulse to selfish or sordid action may be suppressed and a great wave of enthusiasm may move us on to such achievement in service and in sacrifice as shall constitute a compelling influence for a speedy conclusion of this war—a conclusion that will bring us real peace."

A committee, with Mrs. McKee as chairman, has been appointed to take charge of the work. Sandwiches, coffee, ice cream and other refreshments will be served during the afternoons and evenings, beginning this evening with the dance, and continuing thru the week. The booth will be located in the balcony on the second floor and will be handsomely decorated with bunting in the national colors. The net proceeds will be devoted to the purposes of the organization, including the mess fund of the Seventh company. The committee will also serve lunches in a booth on the ground floor, at the left side of the main entrance, from 12 o'clock to 6, every afternoon.

SHORTAGE OF FUNDS CAUSES DROPPING OF GAME WARDENS

PORTLAND, Sept. 18.—On account of depleted finances, State Game Warden Shoemaker has lopped off fourteen deputy game wardens, who will be relieved from duty October 1. One warden is kept for each of the ten districts of the state. Mr. Shoemaker states: "The necessity for revoking these deputy wardens' commissions is due to a continued decrease in the sale of game licenses. The sale of these licenses has decreased for a number of seasons.

"First, several thousand licenses were not taken out in northwestern Oregon this year on account of the duck season having closed on December 31, instead of January 15, as heretofore.

"Secondly, Oregon has sent to the front as her quota in this war about 8000 men, ranging from the ages of 18 to 30. The great majority of these are sportsmen who have been in the habit of taking out either a hunter's or angler's or combination license in the past.

"And third, the closing of the

hunting season shut off a great sale of licenses to the people who take their annual vacation the first two weeks of the deer season."
