DISPUTES HALT PROGRESS OF WAR REVENUE BILL

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Conferees on the war tax bill today sought to reach an agreement on the disputed question of exemption or allowance for intangible assets, such as good will, copyright, patent and other intangible property rights. The controversy is a phase of the effort to agree on a satisfactory definition of invested capital. In hope of completing their work late Monday, the conferees tentatively planned to meet Sunday.

Disagreement over war excess profits taxation continued today to halt the work of conferees on the war tax bill. Definition of invested capital and allowances for intangible assets remained the principal obstacles. Automobile taxation may be reopened before the conferees end. Reduction of present tentative plans to a 2 per cent flat manufacturers' sale tax is being discussed.

FAIR COMES TO CLOSE TONIGHT WITH JAZZ ORCHESTRA

The county fair will come to a close at midnight tonight, when the jazz orchestra will be hushed and the hundreds of dancers expected in attendance will make their way homeward.

No admission will be charged at the doors tonight, because of the fact that today the cream of the agricultural and fruit exhibits are en route for exhibition at the state fair. But even with them gone, the fair will be well worth seeing and an immense crowd is expected.

The outlook this noon was that the fair association would about break even on the fair venture, and everything considered, the fair has been a success. Friday's attendance was 849, a little the largest of the week. The Moose lodge has kindly consented not to hold their regular Saturday night dance tonight, so that their usual patrons can attend the fair dance at the Natatorium.

Last night during the choral concert the large exhibit of D. M. Lowe to Salem, where they will be entered together with a number of the district exhibits, were boxed up and shipped to Salem, where they will be entered in the state fair next week. It had originally been intended to send these exhibits to Salem by express Sunday, but on account of the heavy movement of drafted troops northward, Mr. Lowe was unable to get the promised express cars, so there was nothing to do but box up the exhibits last night and send them to Salem by freight.

The Lowe exhibit comprised 1188 varieties of grains and fruits from the Lowe farm, including the development and showing of three entirely new varieties of barley and one of oats. The exhibit of Floyd S. Charley, which won first prize in the district exhibits, will be one of the features of the Jackson county exhibit at the state fair. The Jackson county exhibit at Salem will be a revelation and something along entirely different lines from exhibits ever seen before at the state fair, according to Mr. Lowe, who has charge of the exhibit and will arrange it.

The Jackson county exhibit will also be shown at the land show at Portland, and later at the dry land congress at Dallas, Tex.

There was a small crowd in attendance at the fair this afternoon.

The biggest and best feature of fair week was the splendid concert given in the main auditorium at the Nat last night before a large audience. The chorals and soloists were liberal in responding to encores from the delighted audience, and altogether the concert was up to the usual high standard and excellence of the choral society, and reflected great credit on the ability of George Andrews as a conductor and organizer.

While the most of the numbers sung by the society last night had been heard rendered before by the same organization by the music lovers of the city, they were none the less appreciated.

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FINE PROGRAM AT HOSPITAL BENEFIT NEXT WEDNESDAY

As to the film which follows the lecture, it has been chosen with special reference to the nature of the evening's entertainment. It is one which has not yet been shown anywhere on the coast, having so recently arrived in this country direct from the battlefields of France. It shows graphic and convincing pictures of the scenes of actual desolation "In the Wake of the Huns," the devastated and outraged regions of French territory recently abandoned before the victorious allied forces.

In view of this unusual offering to the public, and the generosity of the Rialto management in making this benefit to such a deserving institution as the Sacred Heart hospital possible, it is hoped that the public will respond with a generous attendance.
