

# GAS SCHOONER LOST IN ENTERING YAQUIMA HARBOR

NEWPORT, Ore., Oct. 2.—Heavy seas today hid from sight all trace of the gasoline schooner Jack Burnham of Portland, which last night piled up on the rocks of the Yaquina bay jetty and later slid off and settled on the bottom in deep water. When the vessel grounded the three members of the crew jumped into the surf and were rescued by the coast guard crew.

Guy Newton, deck hand, was injured slightly when he struck a piece of wreckage as he jumped overboard. The other members of the crew, Captain Ross Parker and Engineer H. A. Knight were uninjured. They were given dry clothing by the coast guard crew.

Captain Parker said he was attempting to cross the bar into Yaquina bay and was almost over when the vessel slipped water in the stern, which disabled the steering gear. The boat became unmanageable and was carried on to the jetty.

The Burnham had a cargo of freight from Portland to Yaquina bay points. No attempt at salvage will be made.

# HORSE BUYER PROVES MILLIONAIRE

Incidental to the big horse sale held in Medford Monday, the many ranchers and others gathered were in ignorance of the fact that Captain R. E. Strawbridge, of the army quartermaster's department, who was the head of the inspection and purchasing board in charge of the sale, was a multimillionaire.

The captain attracted undue attention in spite of his wealth and social position being unknown here, thru his unflinching courtesy, general democracy and absolute fairness during the sale.

It was not until he had left the city that it became known that his check is good for millions—reputed to be twelve millions—and that he is a member of the well-known eastern Strawbridge family, who own the Strawbridge Manufacturing company of Philadelphia.

The captain has been in the army for a number of years past, and it seems that he prefers to work for Uncle Sam at a comparatively modest pittance to enjoying his wealth in idleness or in the business world.

# CARLOAD OF HORSES BOUGHT FOR ARMY

From the hundred or more horses from all parts of the county offered for sale in Medford on Monday to the government for military purposes Captain Strawbridge and his assistants of the army quartermaster's department found 21 sound animals available for military use, and bought them.

These horses were shipped last night to Camp Lewis, American Lake, Wash., where they will be put into service immediately. Captain Strawbridge and his assistants left last night for Portland, where they will inspect a large number of horses offered for sale there.

The captain decided shortly after his arrival here Monday forenoon to make no purchases of mules at present, tho quite a number of mules were offered for sale.

It is probable that later on Captain Strawbridge will return to Medford to make other purchases from another lot of horses that he may have rounded up before his arrival.

# NEW LOW RECORDS FOR RAIL STOCKS

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—New low records were made on the New York stock exchange by several important railroad stocks. The liquidation was attributed to foreign interests.

Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul common dropped to 5 1/4, its minimum quotation since 1895, and the preferred dropped to 98, which is considerably under its low record for more than 20 years. Baltimore and Ohio, once a popular stock on the Berlin Bourse, fell to 60, its low record since 1900. New York Central at 7 1/2 registered its minimum for about 25 years.

# REVOLUTION ON IN TURKESTAN

PETROGRAD, Monday, Oct. 1.—A revolutionary movement is in progress in Turkestan. General Cherkess, commander of the district, has been attacked and beaten.

A temporary revolutionary committee has been organized to take all power. Parts of two regiments joined in a counter-revolutionary move.

The minister of the interior says he is not alarmed and is confident the disturbances can be quelled.

Government dispatches describe the Turkestan revolt as increasingly serious. Irresponsible elements among the troops have obtained control of the military and seized the officers. The people are in panic.

# RED CROSS CALLS FOR WOOL WORK

Instructions have been received at Red Cross headquarters from the Portland headquarters that owing to the shortage of material all those who take out wool for knitting mufflers, scarfs and wristlets are asked to return the finished garments within four weeks.

Those who have taken out wool are asked to communicate with the Red Cross chapter, as all articles are to be forwarded as soon as possible. And all wool taken from the Red Cross must be returned there. Knitting units are now being formed, and all women knitting or wishing to knit are asked to register, as the wool will only be given out thru the units after this.

# GERMANS STRIVE DESPERATE

is too early yet for the effect of the present attempt to be developed. The British commander, however, reports that the attacks themselves, five in number, were complete failures. The attacks were made on the British positions along the Ypres-Menin road and at the southeastern edge of Polygon Wood.

**To Balk British Plans.**

With the whole German line in Flanders in the balance, the German command is making desperate efforts to balk the British plans and is fighting hard for every inch of ground protecting the Lille-Ostend railway, a scant six miles beyond the present point of the advancing British wedge.

On their front in northern France the French are holding themselves in restraint at present, permitting the crown prince to hammer away at their lines in attacks which almost invariably are repulsed with heavy German losses. Two attacks by the Germans in the Croonne sector on the Aisne front last night were repulsed. Efforts by the Germans on two occasions to re-capture trenches which they had lost in the Beaumont region on the Verdun front also were unsuccessful.

# SENATOR CHAMBERLAIN COMING TO OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2.—United States Senator Chamberlain of Oregon may leave Washington for Oregon as soon as he recovers sufficiently from the attack of appendicitis which has confined him to his apartment recently, according to messages received here today from the national capital.

President Wilson today sent Senator Chamberlain a note saying: "I have been sincerely distressed to hear of your illness. I heard of it only yesterday and hope you will recover without the necessity of an operation."

# SOUTHERN PACIFIC INVESTS FIVE MILLIONS IN BONDS

William Spruile, president of the Southern Pacific company, wired the opening gun in the west's second liberty loan campaign with the announcement last night that the Southern Pacific has subscribed for five million dollars of the new four percent war bonds. Announcement was also made that in order to enable its employees to participate in the new loan the company will, upon the request of any employee, subscribe for any amount bonds desired not exceeding 25 percent of their yearly salary and will advance the whole subscription price, allowing the employee to repay the amounts advanced in monthly payments over a period of two years.

This company made a similar offer to its employees with respect to the Liberty Loan 2 1/2 percent bonds in which the Southern Pacific itself subscribed five million dollars and at that time 19,975 employees representing 27 percent of the total number of persons employed by the company as a whole, subscribed for an aggregate amount of \$1,315,000.

The Southern Pacific has also undertaken to circulate the patriotic posters which are to be used in furthering the campaign, and will display the posters all over its system.

# FIGHT TO A FINISH DEMANDED BY BOTHE

LONDON, Oct. 2.—General Louis Botha, premier of South Africa, in addressing the opening of the convention of the South African parliament, according to a Reuter dispatch from Pretoria, said the war was forced upon the allies, and the only thing to do now was to fight to a finish. The premier added:

"Let peace be one which will be beneficial to the whole world and enable every country to shape its future on a sound basis."

PARIS, Oct. 2.—The government has been invited to place in the pantheon, where many great Frenchmen are buried, an inscription to perpetuate the memory of Captain George Guynemer, the famous French aviator who was killed in action recently as "a symbol of the aspirations and enthusiasm of the army." A resolution to this effect was introduced in the chamber of deputies by Deputy Laesle.
