

PRIZE WINNING HOGS BRING \$20 PER HUNDRED WEIGHT

PORTLAND, Oct. 2.—Conditions in the North Portland yards at the week's opening have been healthy. The tone of the market throughout is good and the receipts show a volume of business that is very gratifying.

Cattle—The string of cattle offered in the yards, generally speaking, was better than those coming at the close of the week. The general range of prices in the cattle pens is the same as for the previous week, with breeder trading very active. The following quotations are current: Best beef steers, \$9@9.75; good beef steers, \$7.50@8.75; best beef cows, \$6.75@7.50; ordinary cows, \$4@6.75; best heifers, \$7@8; bulls, \$4@6.50; calves, \$7@9.50; stockers and feeders, \$4@7.25.

Prize Winners Shown.

Hogs—The hog alleys were treated to a little aristocratic society this week by the presentation of the prize winners from the Salem fair, and the porkers of the Marion County Pig club, some of which, although they came here on contract, are said to have brought as high as 20¢ a pound. Aside from this, one load of strictly prime light packers crossed the scales at \$18.50, which was the top for the day. The general market range is as follows: Prime light, \$18.15@18.25; prime heavy, \$18@18.15; pigs, \$16@17.25; bulk of sales, \$18@18.25.

Sheep—The volume of the business in the sheep houses continues to increase at a satisfactory rate, but the increase does not keep pace with the demand. The packers are in need of more butcher stuff, and the demand for feeders and ewes is very strong. The quotations have advanced a notch, and still the sales are practically all made at the top end of the quotations as on the previous week. The following figures are current: Western lambs, \$13.60@14; valley lambs, \$12.75@15.50; yearlings, \$11.25@11.50; wethers, \$11@11.50; ewes, \$9@9.50.

Raise More Hogs—Hoover.

The necessity of encouraging the farmers to raise three times as many hogs this year as they did last year was emphasized by Herbert Hoover Saturday in addressing a food supply conference composed of members of the Pennsylvania committee on public safety and others interested in the food problems. "We are sending abroad more hog products at the present time than we produce," he asserted.

MOTHER FORCED TO CUT OFF CHILD'S ARM

PIERRE, S. D., Oct. 4.—Mrs. J. B. Clarkson of Harding county was forced to decide whether to amputate the arm of her little daughter, or allow the child to suffer with her arm crushed in the machinery of a power washing machine until she could go a long distance for help. She decided that as the arm was so badly mangled that it would have to be cut off, she would perform the operation. With the implements at hand she cut the suffering child loose, and hurriedly getting a team ready, took her to the nearest physician, where the injured stump was properly cared for.

SPECIAL TRAIN BRINGS SINGERS FOR GRAND OPERA

The La Scala Grand Opera company, which appears at the Page tonight in "Carmen," arrived in the city on a special train of six passenger coaches and two baggage cars at 11 o'clock this forenoon. Including the principals, chorus and musicians, the company numbers about 100.

The arrival of the train at so early an hour today insures no delay in starting the performance tonight. The curtain will rise promptly at 8 p. m. Immediately after the arrival of the train the members of the company scattered about over the city to the hotels and restaurants in search of meals, inasmuch as the train carried no diner. A diner will be attached to the train this evening.

The company only assembled at San Francisco last week from all parts of the country, the principals coming direct from New York. The week was spent in rehearsing, and the first performance by the company was given at Redding, Cal., last night. Immediately after tonight's performance the company will depart on its special train for Tacoma, and from that city will go to Seattle, then to Portland, and from there go back to San Francisco. After the San Francisco engagement the company will start on a long tour of the west and east.

Immediately after the arrival of the train this forenoon, Mme. Ester Ferrabina, the eminent artist who will sing the title role in "Carmen" tonight, and maid went to the Medford hotel to rest up for tonight's performance. A number of the other principals also went to the Medford.

BOLO PASHA, SPY, FINANCED THRU VON BERNSTORFF

(Continued from Page One.)

The first message, dated March 6, 1916, was addressed to the Deutsche bank, and read:

"Communicate with William Foxley (German foreign office) and telegraph whether he has placed money at my disposal with you for Charles Gledhill (Von Bernstorff).

"Hugo Schmidt."

Schmidt received this reply from the Deutsche bank on March 13: "Replying your cable about Charles Gledhill, Fred Hooven (Guaranty Trust company of New York) will receive our account. You may dispose according to our letter of November 24, 1914, to Fred Hooven."

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The investigation of Attorney General Merton E. Lewis into the activities here of Bolo Pasha, under arrest in France as spy and peace propagandist, disclosed that William Randolph Hearst, the newspaper publisher, attended a dinner given in this city by Bolo in March, 1916, according to the attorney general.

Some time prior to this dinner, Mr. Lewis said, Mr. Hearst had entertained Bolo at the editor's home. It was explained by the attorney general that the editor's relations with Bolo were purely social as far as he was aware.

The attorney general was busy examining further witnesses in the Bolo Pasha matter. Further disclosures are expected.

German Money Supplied.

Proof that German money was supplied in this country by Count Von Bernstorff, former German ambassador, to Bolo Pasha, was to be forwarded today to Jules J. Jusserand, the French ambassador. Included in the documentary proof, according to Attorney General Lewis, are photographic reproductions of checks, bank records, letters, cablegrams and other evidences of the disposition of the German money furnished

RIALTO FILM IS BIG DRAMATIC SHOW

Two capacity audiences greeted "The Eyes of the World" at the Rialto theater last night and the film version of the celebrated Harold Bell Wright novel proved a complete justification of the claims made for it in the advance press notices.

ished Bolo Pasha in this country by ex-Ambassador Bernstorff.

The investigation by Attorney General Lewis began eleven days ago. The amount of money which Bernstorff, thru his financial agent, Hugo Schmidt, turned over to Bolo Pasha totaled \$1,683,500, the money coming into possession of Bolo Pasha after it had passed thru a carefully prearranged system of transfers from one bank to another to hide its origin and to make it impossible for one bank to know what part the other institution had in the transfer.

Millions Thru Circ.

The banking institutions which formed what the attorney-general terms the "circle around which the money traveled on its way to Bolo Pasha," were the Deutsche bank, the National Park bank, the Guaranty Trust company, J. P. Morgan & Co., and the Royal Bank of Canada.

The evidence shows, according to Mr. Lewis, that it was thru Schmidt, as the agent of the Deutsche bank of Berlin, that Bernstorff advanced the money to Bolo Pasha.

Bolo Pasha arrived in New York on February 22, 1916, and left on March 17 following. He saw Bernstorff secretly in Washington, it is said. As soon as the money reached the Royal Bank of Canada, New York branch, it was deposited to the credit of Bolo Pasha, and the latter began to check it out. The first check for \$170,000 was deposited with J. P. Morgan & Co. to the credit of Senator Charles Humbert, owner of Le Journal of Paris. The sum of \$524,000 was transferred to Mme. Bolo in Paris, and \$5000 was placed to the credit of Jules Bois, a French lecturer then in the United States. About one million dollars was transferred to Paris and placed to Bolo Pasha's credit in a French bank.

Banks Exonerated.

Attorney General Lewis says the disclosures in no way reflect on M. Bolo, who, he adds, "was one of several men used by Bernstorff and Bolo as a cloak to hide the real nature of the work they were engaged in."

The attorney general also emphasized in his statement that the developments in no way reflect on any of the banks named, the Deutsche bank, of course, excepted. Adolph Pavenstedt, he added, was the only member of the banking firm of G. Amsinck & Co., as that bank was then organized, who knew the Bernstorff-Bolo-Schmidt secret. A few employees who knew that hundreds of

thousands of dollars were coming into the bank in the form of cashiers' checks from the National Park bank and the Guaranty company were enjoined by Mr. Pavenstedt to remain silent, and they did until brought before the attorney general a few days ago.
