MEDFORD NOW IS DISBURSING POINT FOR POSTOFFICES

A recent order of the postoffice department put into effect a radical change affecting the postoffices of Jackson county and makes the Medford postoffice of far more importance and confers more authority and prestige on the Medford postmaster, altho greatly increasing the latter's responsibilities and duties.

By this order, beginning with October 1 the Medford office became the central accounting and disbursing office for all the postoffices of the county except Ashland. Heretofore these postoffices received all their stamps and supplies direct from the postoffice department at Washington.

Now each one of these offices will make all its requisitions for stamps, stamped envelopes, postal cards, etc., upon the Medford postoffice and will receive the supplies from this office, where an ample supply will always be kept on hand.

Each postmaster must make all his quarterly reports to Colonel Geo. P. Mims, the Medford postmaster, who will check them up and forward them to the postoffice department at Washington. Altho this change puts more work and responsibility on Colonel Mims, his salary remains the same and the size of his bond is not increased.

The change was made in order to expedite the delivery of supplies to the postmasters of the smaller offices and to more systematize the keeping of the accounts of the various smaller offices with the postoffice department.

Heretofore much inconvenience was caused the smaller postoffices because of the fact that all requisitions had to be made to Washington, and it took such a long time for the supplies to be expressed back.

The first postmaster to take advantage of the new ruling was the postmaster of Talent, who made a requisition this morning for much-needed supplies. He received them this afternoon.

FRENCH ORPHANS ADOPTED LOCALLY SEND THEIR THANKS

Some thirty-five French war orphans have been "adopted" by Medford people, who have contributed to their support. Concerning their welfare, Mrs. Stewart Patterson has received the following letter:

"Hotel d'Iona, Paris, July 17. "Dear Mrs. Patterson: "We landed in France a short time ago and want to send to you and your committee a line of thanks for all that you did to forward the work of the 'Fatherless Children of France.'"

"We have, too, to convey to you the thanks and gratitude of the Paris committee, and their touching expression of recognition for all the work of the American committees and all your personal work. This has been put on record and we were asked to convey it to you officially.

"We have found everything in excellent order in the Paris office. "We feel sure that if you could have come across with us you would have felt glad, indeed, to think that you had taken any part, even at personal sacrifice, in caring for the children. We hear on all sides that the help you send over not only relieves the anxiety and gives the children help, but it brings, because of the personal character of the work, a ray of real happiness into thousands of saddened homes to the poor women who have lost their dearest.

"We can never forget that the French people had to bear the brunt of the first, and that it is their land that is laid waste, and that they have months ahead of increasing sufferings. They paid the price for us all. It is our common battle for right and liberty, and we know that the American people will never forget the children of the French 'boisles'."

ITALIAN WAR CRUISER BEATS AUSTRIAN CRAFT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Details of the Italian cruiser Aquila's fight in the Adriatic with Austrian airplanes, destroyers and cruisers, reaching here today from Rome, added to cable accounts a thrilling story of how the Italian ship, while fighting a fire in her own hold, drove off the destroyers, was bombed by the hydro-airplanes and singlehandedly engaged three Austrian cruisers until help came up, and then safely got to port under her own steam.
