

CO-OPERATION BETWEEN NAVIES MOST COMPLETE

Secretary Daniels Denies Stories of Friction—British Have Opened Every Door to Admiral Sims and Associates—Plans for U-Boat Warfare Exchanged.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Co-operation between the British admiralty and Vice Admiral Sims and other American naval officers, Secretary Daniels declared today, has been complete since the outbreak of the war. "The spirit shown at the admiralty," Secretary Daniels said, "has been one of perfect openness and frankness and co-operation. Our officers have had access to every bit of information admiralty officials have had in relation to submarine warfare. They have opened every door to Admiral Sims and his associates."

Mr. Daniels statement was prompted by published reports that British inventions for combatting submarines had been withheld. On the contrary he said, every device of which the British navy had knowledge had been fully explained to the American officers. They included some things of which the American experts had no knowledge at the outbreak of war. Correspondingly the American experts gave freely to the British all the plans they had evolved for anti-submarine warfare.

Both navies had worked out depth bombs as a weapon against submarines. The British had a supply available and these have been used by American destroyers, Mr. Daniels said. The American bomb, however, is an improvement in some respects over the British and is now used by both navies.

Reports of lack of co-operation between the two services, Secretary Daniels said, arose from an incident early in the war when a British manufacturer of a patented device wanted by the American navy, asked what was regarded as an exorbitant price.

SEATTLE HUNTS FOR WOMAN SLUGGER

SEATTLE, Oct. 5.—For the second time within three days Miss Esther Thayer, 18, Thursday afternoon, was attacked by the mysterious woman slugger who has been terrorizing the women of Seattle for the past two weeks. This is the fifth attack of the nature and the entire city is aroused in a hunt for the man who is believed responsible for all of them.

Miss Thayer and her grandmother had just left their home this afternoon when the telephone was heard ringing. The grandmother, Mrs. Lavina Crowley, returned to answer the call, leaving the young woman in the yard. When she returned a few minutes later she found Miss Thayer lying on the ground, unconscious, with her clothes torn. This note was found at her side.

Death the Next Time
"This is the second time. The next time it will be death. I am an I. W."

Miss Thayer was attacked the first time last Tuesday afternoon when she was at home alone. Her grandmother returned to find her unconscious in the basement, bound and gagged. The young woman had been beaten when she admitted a strange man who had knocked at the door. Three other women have been the victims of similar attacks in the last two weeks.

NO STALEMATE ON BATTLE FRONT STATES PERSHING

AMERICAN TRAINING QUARTERS IN FRANCE, Oct. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—General Pershing, the American commander, in an interview today, took exception to the statement which according to information received here, is being spread throughout America by means of German propaganda, that the war on the western front will result in a stalemate. He denounced this as an effort to weaken American initiative.

"America has resources in men and material, once they are prepared to add weight to the allies, which must force a military decision against Germany," said the general. He added that the American troops were imbued with the "spirit of aggressiveness and victory."

The American ambassador to France, William G. Sharp, visited the American training camp yesterday. He said on leaving:

"As I watched our splendid young soldiers at their drill, cheerful and determined, I could have no doubt of their victory with the united nation behind them. In the faces of these splendid soldiers I saw the spirit of resolute America."

SIX-CENT FARES DENIED PORTLAND

SALEM, Or., Oct. 5.—The Oregon state public service commission today denied to the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co. permission to increase the fare on its urban car lines in Portland to 6 cents. The company had announced that the granting of a pending petition from its employees for an advance in wages depended on the proposal to increase the fare.

Commissioners Miller and Baehel signed the order of denial and Commissioner Corey wrote a dissenting opinion, favoring the 6-cent fare proposal. While favoring the petition of the employees for better wages and hours than those now in effect, Commissioners Miller and Baehel expressed the opinion that the situation could be met by the introduction of economies in operation, increased efficiency, reduction in service where it exceeds demand and increase in the prices of commodities and school children's tickets.

NATIONAL PARTY NAME FOR MERGER

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—The new political party still in process of formation was christened the "national party" at last night's conference of the five groups which are seeking amalgamation. The plans, however, must await formal approval by the governing national bodies.

It was said that the plan decided on called for the election of a temporary national executive committee at once consisting of four members each from the progressives, prohibitionists, single taxers, social democrats and independents.

The conference also adopted a tentative platform in which a demand for a home dry nation was emphasized. Other names for the new party which were considered were liberal, people's, commonwealth and union.

SECRETARY LANE TO SPEAK IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Oct. 5.—Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, is to speak in Seattle in the interest of the liberty loan campaign, according to a telegram received today from Lane's private secretary, who is with the secretary at Cheyenne, Wyo. The date was not given.

CARMEN PROVES MOST ENJOYABLE TO OPERA PATRONS

The La Scala company gave us Bizet's great masterpiece at the Page last night in an artistic and finished manner. There were two in the cast a little disappointing, but the Carmen and Don Jose, together with the general ensemble, more than made up any deficiency. Ester Ferribini's Carmen was a work of art. It was a finished performance from her entrance in the first act to her tragic death scene at the close of the opera. Her interpretation of the character was strikingly free from any suggestiveness which so often mars this part. In fact, she is one of the few prima donnas that has caught the inspiration of the composer and seems to know exactly what Bizet intended his Carmen to be.

Ferribini is a beautiful woman who possesses all the magnetism and fire of the native Italian, and she looks every inch a Carmen. She certainly made good the reputation that preceded her, of being one of the greatest Carmens now on the operatic stage. She is well supported by Don Jose, which was sung by Giuseppe Gaudenzi. Mr. Gaudenzi showed a few little mannerisms in the first part of the opera, but in the third and fourth acts he convinced us that we were listening to a real tenor, and one that could act. His rendition of the "Flower Song" in the second act was a very artistic piece of work. His fourth act was exceptionally well handled. He portrayed the character of the down-and-out lover in a masterly fashion, and in some of his dramatic scenes he rose to the degree of magnificence. Taking his performance as a whole, it was splendid.

We have not space to give the director, Guerrieri, and his orchestra the praise they deserve. They were certainly a great revelation in the interpretation of the masterpiece Carmen. Mr. Guerrieri is probably one of the best directors living today. He is a wizard. He directs all of these big productions without a note in front of him. He knows and hears and feels every note that is being played and sung in the entire company. He holds every musician and singer right at the point of his baton. It is impossible for an ordinary person to understand the extent of his musical brain. He has fifty-two operas stored away there.
