

shall pass all ordinances and resolutions necessary and proper to carry out the provisions of this article.

VALIDATION OF IMPROVEMENT ASSESSMENTS AND BONDS.

Section 23. Whenever the common council has made, or shall hereafter make, any assessment against property for an improvement authorized by law and this charter, and has in making such assessment acted in good faith and without fraud, or shall hereafter act in good faith and without fraud, the said assessment shall be valid and enforceable as such and a lien upon the property upon which the same purports to be a lien; and all assessments heretofore or hereafter made by the city authorities in good faith and without fraud, and all improvement bonds heretofore issued and intended to be refunded by the refunding improvement bonds mentioned in section 6 hereof, are hereby declared to be valid and binding obligations and in full force and effect until paid or refunded as provided herein, and said assessments are and shall be collectible as provided in this article.

ASSESSMENTS PAID BY JOINT OWNER.

Section 24. Whenever any local assessment, or installment thereof, shall be paid, or any certificate of sale thereon be redeemed, or any judgment thereon be paid by any joint owner or any property assessed for any local improvement, such joint owner may, after demand and refusal, by an action brought in the circuit court, recover from each of his co-owners the respective amounts of such payment which each such co-owner should bear, with interest thereon at ten per cent (10%) per annum from the date of such payments, and costs of the action, and the joint owner making such payment shall have a lien thereon upon the individual interests of his co-owners in and to such property from date of such payment.

CITY MAY PURCHASE AT TAX SALE.

Section 25. Whenever any property situate in the city shall be offered for sale for general taxes, the city shall have the power to protect the lien or liens of any local assessments, outstanding against the whole or any portion of such property by purchase or otherwise.

ACTS REPEALED.

Section 26. All acts and parts of acts of state law and all parts of the city charter in conflict herewith are hereby repealed; and all acts or parts of acts, either general or special, and all parts of the city charter in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed insofar as they conflict herewith or restrict the powers or duties hereby conferred upon said city or its Mayor or Council or other officers. Any acts or parts of acts, or parts of the charter, herein repealed which are enacted in form or substance in this act shall not be construed as new enactments, but as continuations and amendments of such acts or parts of acts.

PUBLICATION.

Section 27. When this act requires notice by publication, such notice shall be published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in said city and published therein, but in case no newspaper is published in said city then the newspaper of largest circulation of said city therein and published nearest to said city of Central Point, except as otherwise in this act provided.

NOTICE TO BE MAILED.

Section 28. In all cases of assessments or installments thereof becoming due and payable, the city recorder shall mail to the owner of the property assessed a copy of the notice required to be published when the next office address of such owner is known, but failure to mail the same shall not be fatal when publication is made.

ASSESSMENTS PAID IN ERROR.

Section 29. Whenever, through error or inadvertence, any person shall pay any local assessment, or installment thereof, upon the lands of another, such payor may, after demand and refusal, by an action in the Circuit Court, recover from the owner of such lands the amount so paid, and costs of the action.

NEW PAVING BASED ON PETITION ONLY.

Section 30. After this article shall become effective, the common council shall not have power to levy special assessments for paving hereafter to be made except upon petition signed by the owners, according to the records in the office of the city recorder, of property to be assessed for the purpose of carrying out the lien of the improvement to be made and of the area within the limits of the assessment district to be created therefor.

ACTS TO BE LIBERALLY CONSTRUED.

Section 31. The rule that statutes in derogation of the common law are to be strictly construed shall have no application to this article, but the same shall be liberally construed for the purpose of carrying out the objects for which this article is intended.

DISCHARGE OF LIENS.

Section 32. Entries of payments of assessments and of installments, interest and costs made under the provisions of this act shall be made in the consolidated lien docket aforesaid as the same shall be received, with the date thereof, and such payments made and entered in said consolidated lien docket shall be and operate as a discharge of such lien, to the amount of such payment, and from the date thereof.

ENFORCEMENT OF SUBSEQUENT LIENS AUTHORIZED.

Section 33. The enforcement of the lien of any installment or interest payment by any method herein authorized shall not prevent the enforcement of the lien of any subsequent installment or interest payment by any method herein authorized when the same shall become delinquent.

PENDING PROCEEDINGS.

Section 34. If any proceedings shall be pending for the enforcement of the lien or liens of any delinquent assessment or assessments for paving or sewers at the time this article becomes effective, the city may proceed with the enforcement of any such lien or liens under the provisions of law and the city charter and ordinances of said city existing at the time of the taking effect of this article, or under the provisions of this article.

OUTSTANDING CERTIFICATES OF SALE.

Section 35. The holder or holders of any outstanding certificate of sale heretofore issued for special assess-

ments for paving or sewers may proceed with the enforcement of the liens of such assessments under the provisions of law and the city charter and ordinances of said city existing at the date this article becomes effective or under this article.

Section 36. This article shall be in full force and effect and be a part of the charter of the city of Central Point, Oregon, when approved by a majority of the votes cast thereon at an election held in said city on the 16th day of October, A. D. 1917.

Section 2. That the foregoing amendment to the charter of the city is hereby adopted and submitted to the legal voters of the city of Central Point for their rejection or approval, to be voted on at a special election, as provided in Section 3 of this ordinance.

Section 3. A special election is hereby called and ordered to be held in and for said city on the 16th day of October, A. D. 1917, for the purpose of voting on the said proposed amendment, and the city recorder is hereby directed to give notice of said election by publishing the same at least once a week for two successive weeks prior to said election in a newspaper of general circulation published in said city, or in case no newspaper is published in said city, then said notice shall be published in the newspaper of largest circulation in said city and published nearest to the city of Central Point, and hereby designated the official newspaper thereof, and by posting the said notice in at least three public and conspicuous places in said city, and said notice shall be published and posted at least ten days prior to the date of said election which notice shall be in substantially the following form:

SPECIAL CITY ELECTION NOTICE. STATE OF OREGON. County of Jackson, City of Central Point, ss.: Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the city of Central Point, Jackson County, Oregon, on Tuesday, to-wit: the 16th day of October, A. D. 1917, between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m.

The polling place for said election shall be at the City Hall in the City of Central Point, Oregon. The three following named legal voters of said city are hereby designated and appointed judges of said election, two of whom shall act as clerks thereof:

L. Hatfield, J. W. Jacobs, J. B. Holmes, Judges and Clerks of Election. Said election is called and held for voting upon the adoption or rejection of a certain amendment to the charter of the City of Central Point, Oregon, adopted by the common council and submitted by the common council to the voters of the city.

Said proposed amendment is printed in pamphlet form by the city and copies mailed to every legal voter within the city whose address is known, and said pamphlet can be had at the office of the recorder of said city upon application.

The general purport of said charter amendment is expressed in the ballot title thereof adopted by the common council, and which will appear upon the ballot with a corresponding number, as follows:

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL. Shall the Charter of Central Point be amended by adding thereto Article XXV, and thereby provide for the collection in thirteen years of the unpaid assessments for local improvements made in the year 1911, and provide for the issuance of refunding bonds in a sum not to exceed \$80,000 for the purpose of redeeming the outstanding unpaid bonds and warrants issued in said year for paying the costs of said improvements, together with interest thereon, and refunding bonds to be made in thirteen years and bear interest at six per centum per annum, as provided in Ordinance No. 116?

Section 7. The form of the official ballots for use at said election shall be printed in substantially the following form: OFFICIAL BALLOT FOR THE SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF CENTRAL POINT, JACKSON COUNTY, OREGON, OCTOBER 16, A. D. 1917.

Those voting in favor of the amendment submitted will mark their ballot with an X between the number and the word "Yes." Those voting against the amendment submitted will mark their ballot with an X between the number and the word "No."

Section 8. Should any of the judges appointed by this ordinance fail or refuse to appear or qualify, the qualified voters present at the time of the opening of the polls shall elect some legal voter to act as such judge to fill the vacancy. Before proceeding to perform any official act at such election, the judges shall each make and subscribe an oath of office in substantially the following form:

"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States and of the state of Oregon, and I will, to the best of my ability, faithfully perform the duties of judge of election during my continuance therein, so help me God."

Section 9. Inasmuch as it is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of said city that the amendment to the charter of said city herein provided for shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said city and adopted as soon as the provision of law will permit and the credit of said city thereby be maintained, an emergency is hereby declared, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval by the mayor.

An Ordinance amending Section 5 of Ordinance No. 882, entitled "An ordinance regulating public billiard rooms, public pool rooms, public card rooms, and the operation of public card tables; fixing an annual license fee therefor; providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance," passed by the city council and approved by the mayor May 2, 1917, as amended by the city council and approved by the mayor May 31, 1917.

The City of Medford doth ordain as follows: Section 1. That section 5 of ordinance No. 882, entitled "An ordinance regulating public billiard rooms, public pool rooms, public card rooms, and the operation of public card tables; fixing an annual license fee therefor; providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance," passed by the city council and approved by the mayor May 2, 1917, as amended by the city council and approved by the mayor May 31, 1917, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Upon the acceptance by the city council of any such application for license, the applicant shall forthwith file with the city recorder the official receipt of the city treasurer showing full payment of the license fee herein above fixed, and therewith shall file a bond, with one or more sufficient sureties, to be approved by the city council, in the penal sum of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars, payable to the city of Medford, and conditioned that the licensee named in the license applied shall, during the term of such license, faithfully observe both the ordinances of the City of Medford and the laws of the State of Oregon relating to gambling, games of chance and intoxicating liquors and that upon a violation thereof said bond shall be forfeited to said City of Medford; and thereupon the city recorder shall issue to such applicant a license specifying therein the number of tables authorized thereby, and a definite description of the premises where the business thereby licensed is to be for the calendar year and no fractional license shall be granted or issued. The licensee shall, upon being notified of such revocation of license, immediately surrender his license to the city recorder.
