

LOCAL POSTAGE RATE 2 CENTS; OUTSIDE, 3 CENTS

Postmaster Mims has received instructions from the postmaster-general explaining the increased postage rates that will go into effect on November 2, as provided in the new war tax law.

Beginning on that date every sealed letter addressed to a place outside the city or off the rural routes of the Medford postoffice must have 3 cents postage on it; and all postal cards must have a 1-cent stamp attached, and all postcards must bear 2 cents in postage.

However, all sealed letters addressed to any one in the city or the rural routes running out of the city will go for 2 cents postage, as now.

"On and after November 2 postage will be collected as follows," reads in part the official order to the postmasters. "A rate of 3 cents on one or fraction thereof on letters and other first-class mail matter, except drop letters. All drop letters

that is, letters mailed for delivery from the office at which posted, including those for delivery by city, rural or other carrier of such office, are required to have postage paid on them at the rate of 2 cents an ounce or fraction thereof.

"Postal cards are required to be prepaid 2 cents, and therefore the 1-cent postal cards must have a 1-cent stamp affixed on them, in addition to the 1-cent stamp impressed on such cards.

"Post cards (private mailing cards) bearing written messages must have 2 cents postage prepaid on them."

PRIZE POTATO GROWER TELLS OF TRIP TO SALEM

Andrew Stevens, aged 11, of Talent, who won the grand prize at the Jackson county fair for potato raising, comprising a trip to the state fair at Salem, where he also won the grand prize for potato raising, a two weeks' trip to the O. A. C. at Corvallis, next spring, writes of his Salem trip as follows:

"Having won the grand prize at the county fair on potatoes, I got the trip to the state fair in return for my work. I got on the train at Medford Monday morning. We arrived at the fair grounds at 1 a. m. There Mr. and Mrs. Seamour and Mr. Lowe met us at the train. It had been raining that night.

"The first thing in the morning I got acquainted with Mr. Vedder, our superintendent, who showed us where to wash. We went in and ate breakfast.

"We cleaned up the fair grounds.

There were only four boys there that morning. Two got the water for the cooks and two got the wood. Then we were dismissed until 11:29 o'clock. We went to the stock barns during that time. There was one big steer that weighed 2500. It was the biggest one I ever saw. I saw some little Shelton ponies I would like to have. When all of them were there there were 34 in camp.

"I rode on a Ferris wheel for the first time in my life while I was up there. I saw so much I wouldn't take anything for my trip. I wish all the other boys and girls could get to go because it is worth more than money.

"My father paid my way to Cottage Grove and I stayed over a week there. On the way back I saw the ruins left by a big forest fire, the stumps were still burning.

"I got to Medford at 4:30 Oct. 4th. We got on the interurban and came home.

"I want to thank all the people that helped me, for their kindness and my good time. ANDREW STEVENS.
