the Teutons to make a drive toward Petrograd this year. It has been pointed out, however, that such a move probably could be carried out with comparative ease at present, with the Russian armies in their admittedly disorganized state, whereas next spring there is governmental promise of a Russian military reorganization after a winter's organization work along new lines.

On the Flanders front the heavy rain which stopped Field Marshal Haig's drive before all his objectives were attained, was continuing today, increasing the depth of the sticky mud thru which the British have been struggling in their advances. The mud evidently was hampering the Germans equally, for they failed to deliver a counter-attack during the night.

On the French front, the chief activities have been in the Aisne region. The German crow's-peece made several attacks last night on French positions on this front. He was met with effective resistance by General
