FEDERAL MEDIATORS BUSY AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—Members of the federal adjustment board commenced their work in Portland today. They will examine into the strike situation in the steel and wooden ship yards. More than 7000 men are on strike and work stopped on a score of vessels in an advanced stage of construction. The board is expected to remain here a week before going to San Francisco. The findings and recommendations of the members will not be made public until investigations on the Pacific coast are completed, it was announced.
