Orders received Sunday by Captain James J. Crossley changed the time of departure of C company for Clackamas from Monday morning, as first announced, to this evening.

The entire company, 140 men, will march to the depot about fifteen minutes before train time in order that the soldiers may have time to bid farewell to their many friends.

For the first time since the company came to Medford, several months ago, its entire membership, barring five, who are sick and on leave of absence, was assembled Sunday when the details which have been on duty in the Siskiyou and the Wolfe Creek-Leland district, were ordered off guard duty and returned to the camp in this city.

Monday was a busy day at the camp, as the work of tearing down and packing up, cleaning up of the grounds, and the checking up of all equipment and supplies was begun early and had to be completed long before train time.

It is anticipated that many friends of the soldiers will gather at the depot this evening to bid the company a last farewell.

26,500 LETTERS A DAY RECEIVED AT CAMP LEWIS

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 15.—With the rapid arrival of troops the mail at the Camp Lewis branch of the Tacoma postoffice has increased until the original force of sixteen clerks provided for in the arrangement made by Postmaster Calvin W. Stewart has increased many times over that number. Cancellations have reached 56,500 letters a day, while the parcel post packages for the soldiers are so heavy that two large quartermaster trucks are needed in the distribution to regimental headquarters. Experienced clerks from Portland, Spokane and Seattle have been detailed to the Tacoma branch.

The Y. M. C. A. auditorium, capable of seating 3000 persons, will be finished in five or six days, it was announced at the Y. M. C. A. headquarters yesterday afternoon. A lecture course has been arranged for and at least three interesting programs will be given each week.

Services were held in six buildings yesterday. Mass was celebrated in Knights of Columbus hall.

A deserter from Camp Lewis was caught at Kent Saturday afternoon by a military police and brought back to camp, where he now is waiting court martial. The authorities are undetermined whether the man is mentally unbalanced or is feigning.

RUSSIANS HALT GERMAN SHIPS

aspirations recently displayed in the fleet undoubtedly contributed to the German success. Only the Isovista, organ of the council of soldiers' and workmen's delegates, looks on the disaster as a blessing in some respects, saying the news of the German landing came at a time when Russia, learning of the troubles in the German navy, was beginning to entertain dangerous and unsounded illusions regarding the imaginary disorganization of the enemy.

The landing of the Germans has increased the exodus from Petrograd, which has been noticeable since the fall of Riga. Since Saturday the ticket offices have been besieged, many persons offering large premiums for tickets. The situation is aggravated by rumors which were branded officially as unfounded, that passenger traffic will be stopped shortly, in view of the expected evacuation of government institutions. It is stated in government circles that no extensive evacuation is looked for, as no immediate danger threatens the capital.

Roads Impassable. The new front is still 300 miles distant, it is pointed out, and the

roads are impassable. It is not believed a landing in Finland will be attempted owing to the scarcity of supplies there and to the fact that provisioning would be rendered difficult with winter approaching, by the freezing of the sea.

The central committee of the fleet has addressed to the sailors an appeal which has caused cessation of the meetings at Helsingfors. The semi-official news agency says the first naval engagements in the Ossel waters have shown that an appeal to the crews of the fleet may be counted on with certainty. Possession of the Gulf of Riga by the Germans appears to military writers to be a most serious menace and to give a considerable advantage to the enemy, who will be able to make secure his communication with Riga by sea.

GERMANS REPORT PROGRESS. BERLIN, Oct. 15.—Rapid progress has been made by the German troops which landed on the Russian island of Oesel, according to the official statement issued today by the German war office. German warships silenced the Russian land batteries and the Russian land batteries and silenced them. Svorn peninsula has been cut off from the northern part of the island.
