

WHERE IS NUMBER 666 REFERRED TO IN BIBLE PROPHECY?

To the Editor:

WHEAT CROP IS GRADED HIGH

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—A large part of this year's wheat crop has graded high at the markets—No. 3 or better—under the federal wheat standards made effective this year, the department of agriculture announced today. Persistent false rumors have been circulated in the grain trade, and particularly among country shippers and producers, says the department, that under the new federal standards for wheat very little of the marketed crop is being or has been placed in the higher grades. On the contrary, it says, the requirements of the federal standards for wheat are not such as to work hardship on the country shippers and producers, for under these standards high grades have been given to a heavy percentage of the wheat marketed.
