

LIBERTY BOND CAMPAIGN TO OPEN TONIGHT

Patriotic Meeting at the Nat at Which Senator Garland and W. S. U'Ren Will Speak and Medford Choral Society Furnish Music—List of Bond Buyers to Be Printed.

The formal opening of the second liberty bond subscription campaign will take place at the Natatorium tonight, when it is hoped that the large hall will be crowded with patriotic citizens of the city and vicinity.

The program will begin at 8 o'clock. The speakers will be Hon. Samuel M. Garland of Lebanon, state senator from Linn county, and W. S. U'Ren of Oregon City, the father of the Oregon system. W. H. Gore, chairman of the county liberty loan bond campaign, will preside at the meeting, and the Medford Choral society of 125 voices will render a number of selections.

The singing will be made a popular feature. The choral society will sing patriotic songs and the audience is expected to join in.

Central Point Meeting.

This afternoon at a largely attended liberty loan bond meeting at Central Point, Messrs. Garland and U'Ren were the speakers. Reports received by telephone from the meeting were to the effect that it was a very enthusiastic gathering and that the campaign thus launched in that vicinity would result in many liberty loan bonds being subscribed for in Central Point and vicinity.

Blaine Klum of the Klum Advertising company has volunteered his services and billboards, gratis, to the campaign committee and will cover the bill boards with the government posters as soon as they arrive, or in case they do not arrive in time, will make suitable posters advertising the liberty loan bonds and put them up.

Monday Mr. Klum erected a large new billboard on Haymarket square, opposite the Commercial club, where in large letters the admonition, "Buy a Liberty Loan Bond," reminds every passer-by of his or her duty.

To Print Roll of Honor.

The publicity committee has decided to publish in full all subscriptions to the liberty loan, publishing in Wednesday's issue the list of subscribers to the first loan, and thereafter the daily list of subscriptions as received.

Honor window cards are being printed for distribution to liberty bond subscribers and every subscriber will "show his colors" to the public, so that people may know who the patriots are.

An effort is under way to organize a syndicate to offer the bonds to the public at \$1 down and \$1 per week, or other small installments. It is believed that in this manner the sale of bonds will be greatly stimulated. All business houses and employers of labor are urged to similarly finance their employees. One business house has enabled its employees to purchase fifteen bonds by this method, where probably not a bond would have been taken otherwise. In this manner, everyone can buy a bond.

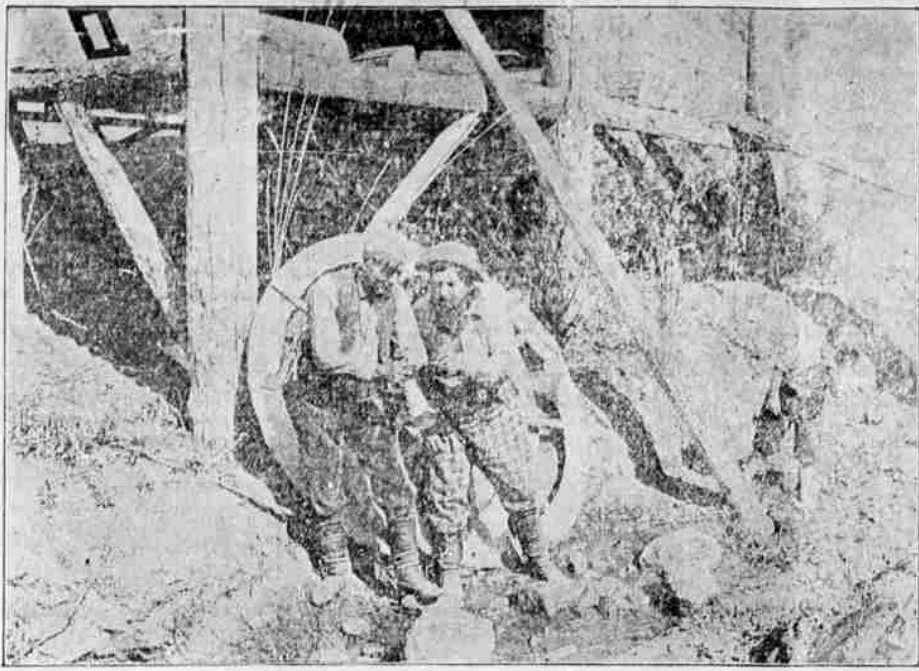
STORIES OF GERMAN WEAKNESS ARE DUE TO PROPAGANDA

DETROIT, Oct. 16.—The Liberty motor and America's new merchant marine will prove tremendous factors in crushing German militarism, said Lord Northcliffe, head of the British war mission, in an informal talk here today. The British publisher made this statement before he left his hotel to visit several automobile factories.

"The Liberty motor, if perfected, will help inconceivably in carrying our forces beyond the German lines, but the motor must be perfect," Lord Northcliffe said. He urged that Detroit factories and Detroit workmen continue to vigorously assist the government in providing war materials, and he ridiculed reports that Germany was facing an economic collapse.

"No heed should be paid to reports of weakness or debilitation in Germany," he said. "These reports are manufactured and sent out from Germany for the deliberate purpose of slackening America's efforts. Foreign newspapers in England were suppressed the first fortnight of the war. That is what the United States should do."

INTERNED GERMANS ESCAPE AT 'FRISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.—Two German aliens, who escaped in a boat from the detention camp on Angel Island in San Francisco bay early today, were captured within a few hours after their disappearance had been discovered.

The two interned aliens were last seen by the authorities late last night. Their disappearance was discovered shortly before daybreak today.

The escape closely followed orders from Washington to send approximately 160 interned aliens from the Angel Island camp to eastern internment camps. Commissioner of Immigration Edward White had prepared to transfer the aliens by special train tomorrow. These plans will probably be held up pending capture of the fugitives.

TWO GERMAN WARSHIPS SUNK

The military situation on the various fronts in the western war era was virtually unchanged over night, so far as the official statements reveal.

The German reports have begun to lay stress upon the violence of the artillery fire on the Flanders, but there are no indications that the bombardment has yet been worked up to the point where the British find themselves ready for a renewal of their drive.

Haig Handicapped.

Evidently, much depends upon the weather in this region. In the light of his last week's experience with the handicap of the Flanders mud, it seems probable that Field Marshal Haig will await the settling of the ground into a somewhat more passable state, altho the hope of securing even ordinarily good conditions at this late season seems now to be considered small.

On the French front the activities are centered on the Aisne and before Verdun. Last night's fighting in both regions was mostly monopolized by the artillery.

British casualties continue to show a declining rate. The total reported in the last week was 14,096 as compared with 17,505 for the week closing October 9, and 21,179 for the preceding week. This is despite the fact that the British have been heavily engaged in Flanders during the past three weeks.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 16.—A cordon of police was thrown today about every shipper in Portland, where strike troubles which resulted in an outbreak of rioting yesterday seemed likely to flare into more disorder. No trouble of any kind was reported today, however, and as the day progresses and signs of disorder diminished, the police gradually were withdrawn. Prompt action by the authorities yesterday and preparations made to quell any outbreak today, are believed to have averted the crisis.

Crowds of strikers gathered near the various plants today but no demonstrations were attempted.

ALLIED AERIAL RAIDS BELGIUM CONTINUE

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The aerial raids over Belgium were continued yesterday. In patrol encounters two German machines were driven down. The following official statement was made public today:

"A considerable number of patrols were carried out yesterday by naval aircraft on the several enemy aeroplane formations which were encountered. The enemy machines were brought down. None of our machines is missing.

"During 24 hours bombing raids were carried out on the Bruges docks, Varsenaere airdrome and Houttaye airdrome. Large quantities of explosives were dropped with good effect, all our machines returning safely."

The offering of certificates just closes the total offered by the government in anticipation of second liberty bond receipts up to \$1,500,000,000. The latest issue was the fifth, two of the issues, aggregating \$750,000,000, bearing 4 per cent interest, and the first three paying 3 1/2 per cent. The latest issue of certificates matures November 22 and is convertible into liberty bonds if presented to reserve banks November 15.

RAIL PROBLEM CENTRALIZING INTO PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Max Thelen of California, president of the National Association of Railway commissioners, in addressing the delegates of the association, who represent 31 states, today said the railroad problem in the United States has prominently moved beyond the ownership and operation of the railroads as disconnected entities by private companies.

"The issue now and hereafter," he declared, "is an issue between consolidated operation of our railroads in private ownership and their unified operation directly by the government thru government ownership."

"There is need of greater co-operation between the state and federal regulatory bodies," said Chairman Hall of the Interstate Commerce commission, "and this meeting can prepare a way for such co-operation. We must consider the needs of the shippers, carriers and the public, not their desires, and the needs of the country at war."
